OPEN LETTER.
To the Hon. Donald Farquharson, the Unsousd Leader.
Sir.—Some time has elapsed since I addressed you my last letter. I fully expected the sound advice which I tendered to you would not be wholly lost upon you. Instead you have persisted in your mad, reckless and wild career, and gone from bad to worse. The voice of the people east and west has proclaimed against you that the policy of "drift" must stop. Belfast and Murray Harbor have spoken in no mistakable terms that they have no confidence in you. An honorable man under these circumstances must resign at once. You have failed in publishing a correct account of the financial situation, you failed in publishing the ruinous and reckless agreement about the Hillsborough Bridge, you failed to publish the report of the asylum investigation, and true to your instincts, a moribund government dismisses the Superintendent, Dr. Blanchard. We should have had the report of the Commissioners before anything like this should have taken place. You have made a political institution of the asylum, and it is not to be expected that the country will much longer permit you to trade upon an institution that may yet be called upon to receive yourself into its unfortunate wards.
The situation of the country is truly alarming. "No confidence" has been voted by the country against you. You still cling to the flesh-pots and pursue your mad course. Just take a retrospective glance at your Government's record since 1891. In that year there was a partial election. The Conservative candidate contended for a bait. The accounts should have been published. You made merchandise of the schools to carry that election and the revenue of the province has suffered from that same mad career. Well you gained power as a party. You proclaimed to the country that you hoped the day of taxation was far distant. With a false cry you carried the election. You then immediately levied taxes on the dead and the living. The next election with a false cry of an arbitration you raised the hopes of the electorate to an expectation of a large subsidy from the Dominion Government that at least a million dollars would be placed to the credit of this Province and the farmers would never again be called upon to pay any more taxes. The arbitration fad was knocked cold by Laurier's announcement in parliament. Peters took his departure to British Columbia. Warburton succeeded him. When the latter found a comfortable berth he also took his departure. You have succeeded to the leadership of the "rump," and I do not know where you will shelve yourself unless it be the position of night watchman on the dredge—to watch and guard the steam tug that is receiving \$25 per day from the master of the administration, Tarte! Yes! the old surveying scow needs a watchman also. It is too valuable a craft to go on the shoals. I don't at all mean to insinuate that these would not be honorable positions. They are king to the one you hold now. After losing the confidence of the country an honorable man would not hold on to power one moment, but would place his resignation in the hands of the Governor and call the Leader of the Opposition to take command. At least, such is the course which is being advocated by honorable men everywhere. You prefer to hang on to the offices. Well, be sure of this that the country will demand a full and open account of every transaction by you, every contract, every road job, every report, every appointment and every supply furnished and by whom to the asylum, provincial goals, etc., etc., and when your successors will take the country into their confidence and propound their policy, they will be expected to do their duty; and if they don't they too will be turned out. This country must rise above party and place its finances on a healthy basis. But if the taxes must be raised the people must be informed how they are spent.
I will not advert to the Hillsboro Bridge further than to say that I am disappointed that the public has no separate roadway from the railway. They can only use the bridge when the railway is not running. This is a humbug if the public must travel on the same passage as the cars. Then your bargain with the Dominion is the most scandalous and iniquitous that could be made, for it will not cost the Dominion one thousand dollars a year extra, whereas I am assured Mr. Davies has sacrificed this province twelve thousand a year and you were like the potter's clay in his hands. The Belfast and Murray Harbor election was doubtless viewed by you somewhat like Philip when he sent his lieutenants Atalau and Parmenio into Asia. As usual before all expeditions of importance he consulted the Delphic Oracle and received the following response equally applicable to the prosperous or unsuccessful event of war: "The Bull is ready crowned; his end approaches, and he will soon be sacrificed." The prophecy said Philip, is quite clear, the Bull is the monarch of Persia. The prediction found its accomplishment, but Philip himself was the victim. You, in like manner, went to Moncton to consult your oracle. You brought him to the Belfast and Murray Harbor district, and predicted that the Bull was McLean and Prowse. But, oh! how unfortunate when the oracle's word correctly interpreted applies to yourself "The Bull is ready crowned; his end approaches, and he will soon be sacrificed. Learn wisdom. Resign. I tender to you this gentle reminder—lest you should forget!"

OBITUARY.
