Metropolitan Committee Reports Steps Necessary

PART THREE
 K. The need for improved police protection in the three areas.
 At present Charlottetown has a police force consisting of eighteen men of all ranks. The Police Department has one police patrol and one motorcycle.
 Parkdale and Spring Park are patrolled by the R.C.M.P. With the growth of these two communities, the requirement for police protection has become greater — so much so that the commissioners of Parkdale have considered the employment of a constable for their village. It should be realized of course that one constable could not give service 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
 L. The need for improved planning and zoning for the three areas.
 The Department of Town Planning set up by the Provincial Government is exercising the needed control in areas outside the city. However, the total area of Charlottetown, Parkdale and Spring Park is sufficiently compact to allow for integrated zoning for residential, business, industrial and recreational uses.
 M. The problem of financing the improvements required by each of the three communities.
 The problem of financing is actually the sum total of all the other problems. If the communities, either separately or collectively, had all the money required there would be no problems. Money would be used for sewage, water, education, administration, fire-fighting equipment, streets, sidewalks and other necessary services.
 Most, if not all, of the problems have arisen because of the lack of money to do what was required when required.
POOL RESOURCES
 Because money for capital works and services is today difficult to procure, and expensive, the greatest skill must be exercised in the dispersment of the funds procured. The maximum amount of works and services must be procured and maintained for the minimum amount of money spent. Therefore it is only reasonable to suppose, and this Committee believes it can in this report show, that by pooling all the resources of the three areas, much more can be procured in works, services, and general civic amenities for each dollar spent than would be possible if each of the three areas attempted to provide the same separately.
 Financing of capital works and services by municipalities is difficult at any time and is particularly so today because of high prices and rising costs.
 It is reasonable to suppose that if Parkdale and Spring Park were part of Charlottetown, the Metropolitan City of Charlottetown could borrow more money at a lower rate than could the three communities acting separately and individually.
INVESTORS
 The reason behind this supposition is twofold.
 First, investors study the community whose bonds etc., they may

buy. Charlottetown, though its assessment value and its revenues have risen sharply these last five years (because of the ever increasing area taken over for business, industry and administrative uses), has not shown a favourable increase in its population. For the Metropolitan Charlottetown area adequate total police protection could be had as aforementioned for something like an additional \$12,000.00 annually over and above the present City of Charlottetown Police expenditures. should run to at least \$3,000.00 annually, it is felt, and thus would leave a net cost of approximately \$12,000.00 per year.
 On the other hand if no amalgamation were to take place, it appears obvious that the Villages of Parkdale and Spring Park by the R.C.M.P. would have to take place, it appears obvious that the Villages of Parkdale and Spring Park would ultimately need additional police protection of their own, and even if they acted jointly in this regard, the very minimum requirements may well be four men, serving 8 hour shifts, and 1 man on the spare board covering sickness, holidays and the like. The question of a patrol or some means of conveyance would likewise have to be faced, as well as possible quarters for such a Force.
 It would thus appear obvious that Parkdale and Spring Park would have nothing to lose from

the aspect of Police Services from amalgamation, and on the other hand would more likely have much to gain. Naturally, if amalgamation took place, there would be a direct saving to the Province by the amount that it now pays for the policing of the Villages of Parkdale and Spring Park by the R.C.M.P.
 For the Metropolitan Charlottetown area adequate total police protection could be had as aforementioned for something like an additional \$12,000.00 annually over and above the present City of Charlottetown Police expenditures. (To Be Continued)
