The Montreal Witness gives the following important information:—

"Two years ago there were seven cotton mills in the Dominion; now there are twenty-one, engaging in the aggregate an approximate capital of \$6,600,000, as follows:—

One hundred and fifty thousand emigrants are to come to Canada and to settle in the North-West next year. Now the Reform campaign sheet said every emigrant coming to Canada is worth \$800 to the Dominion. If the calculation is correct, the 150,000 emigrants of next year will be worth \$120,000,000 to the country. Add to that \$64,000,000, the value of the 80,000 emigrants of this year, and we have an addition to the wealth of Canada in consequence of the construction of the Pacific railway of \$184,000,000. And yet David Mills said the Pacific railway would not pay.

There have been several secessions among members of the Hebrew faith in Montreal, on account of a difference of views, some being inclined to advance in a modern fashion, and others to stand by the old lines. The latest withdrawal and establishment of a new synagogue is by those holding the most primitive principles.
