### Brides Father Officiates At Double Ring Ceremony

Sprays of Heather and Sweet Peas, tied with white satin bows, marked the guest guests at Brunswick Street United Church, Truro, on Saturday, August twenty-second, when Rev. William C. Picketts performed the double ring ceremony to unite in marriage his elder daughter, Nora Elaine, with Paul Meech Robinson, B.A., younger son of Mr. and Mrs. Travis S. Robinson, all of Truro.

Immediately before the bridal party entered the sanctuary, the Brunswick Street Church choir, of which the bride is a member, sang "The Lord is My Shepherd" to Crimond. Miss Sharon Hopper, guest soloist, sang "O Perfect Love," during the signing of the register. Mrs. G. K. Burrows was organist.

White lighted tapers in brass candleholders on the pulpit, with large baskets of white and pastel shaded gladioli on the altar and in the choir loft, formed a lovely background as the young couple exchanged their marriage vows.

The radiant young bride was led to the altar by her brother Jack Picketts, who also gave her in marriage.

Her full length gown was of white brocade taffeta with fitted bodice, fastened in back with tiny covered buttons. The long sleeves of her gown tapered to a point from her wrists. At the soft V-neckline of the bodice she wore a single strand of pearls, the gift of the groom. The graceful folds of her full skirt terminated in a chapel train at the back. Her finger-tip veil of tulle illusion was attached to a headdress of Chantilly lace, richly embroidered with tiny crystal beads and seed pearls. Her bridal bouquet was a cascade of sweetheart roses, lilies of the valley, and baby's breath.

Miss Anne Picketts attended her sister as maid of honor. Her gown of cream-yellow brocade taffeta was also fashioned with fitted bodice, and a very full skirt of ballerina length. She wore a matching headdress of brocade taffeta, with small yellow velvet bows and white daisies. The lace-covered table was centred by a three tiered wedding cake, which the bride and groom cut with the sterling silver knife used by the bride's parents at their wedding twenty-five years before.

However, what do you think of a son and daughter-in-law who, in their three years of married life, have eaten with his parents many times, and, to date, have never yet issued a return invitation for so much as a hamburger?

I am of the opinion that this is carrying the so-called "bride's privilege" just a little far; and that three solid years of it smacks of plain ignorance and/or complete indifference. What do you say? B.B.

**FEARS COMPARISON**  
Dear B.B.: This picture is so strikingly off balance, on the score of courtesy, that I am surprised you don't know what's back of it. I can only guess. But if the new-weds are often your guests at meals, it can hardly be indifference or ignorance.

Perhaps the bride is afraid of your taste and judgment. Or overwashed in the sense that she feels inadequate, clumsy and home-made in comparison to you, in the roles of hostess and homemaker especially.

Possibly she comes of less social background, less accustomed to having friends and in-laws at table, maybe because her parents felt they couldn't afford the extra outlay, in her formative years. Thus, while she responds gratefully to your invitations, she may shrink from the test of trying to repay in kind, because she assumes they've nothing to offer, on a par with your customary hospitality or standard of living.

I believe with Harry S. Truman (who was so quoted, at least) that the best way to help young persons succeed in life is to find out what they want to do and encourage them to do it. Since you have a goal in mind, you're that much ahead. If you hope to be an actress, work at it, and modeling may develop as a sideline activity, when you've learned how to dramatize yourself.

To locate acting schools within your reach, consult your local public librarian for sources of information. There must be school directories or theater magazines on file, that would supply clues.

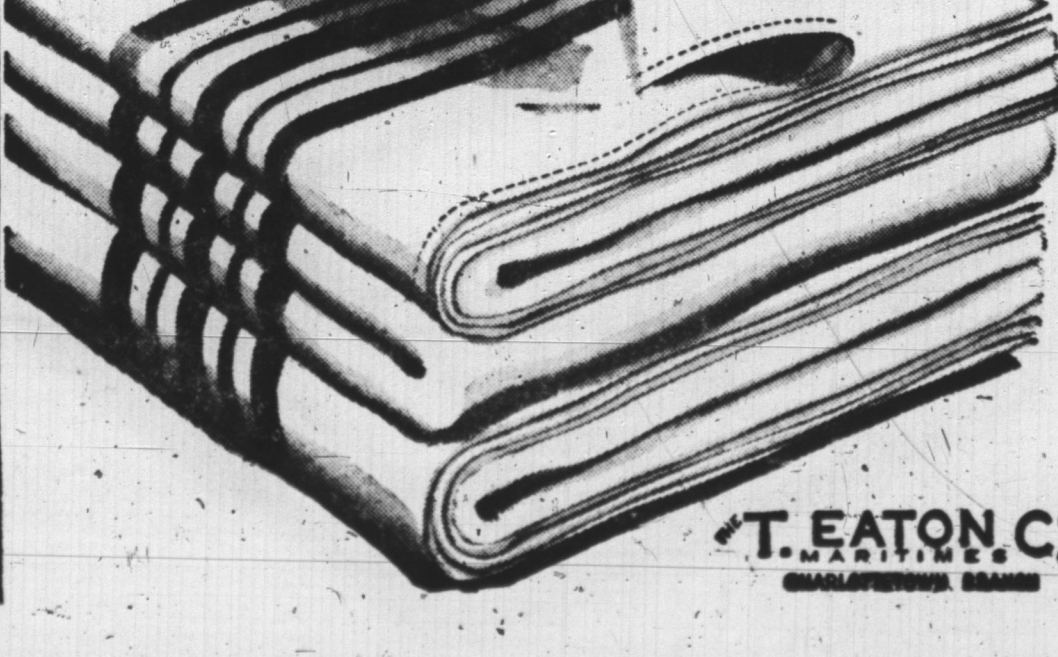
