It is expected that the affair will end in a duel between Dr. Frichs, President of the Chamber, and Herr Wolf.

### CANADA'S MINERAL PRODUCTION

#### Nova Scotia Makes best Showing in Gold Output.

OTTAWA, Dec. 16.—B. T. A. Bell, editor of the Canadian Mining Review, estimates that the value of Canada's mineral production this year will be \$40,000,000, and says that Nova Scotia is making relatively the best showing in gold mining.

The output of gold in that province this year will be about 30,000 ounces, \$60,000 better than last year.

#### Bonapartists Active.

MARSEILLES, Dec. 14.—At a meeting of French Imperialists here, a letter was read from Prince Victor Napoleon, in which he reminded his hearers that the day was the fiftieth anniversary of the accession of Louis Napoleon to the throne of France. He said a similar Bonapartist triumph now would alone put an end to anarchy and restore order to France. Numerous speakers at the meeting denounced the present form of government for its laxity, and clamoured for another Napoleon.

#### Les Majeste

BERLIN, Dec. 15.—The trial of Frank Knaak, of New York, charged with Les Majeste, in referring to Emperor William as a "heep's head," has been fixed for Dec. 20. He is still in prison, bail being refused, and the United States embassy being unable to interfere in the case. The defence will prove that Mr Knaak, on the day he is said to have spoken disrespectfully of His Majesty, was intoxicated, and that when he was sober he always spoke respectfully of the Emperor.

#### Hardy's View.

TORONTO, Dec. 15.—Premier Hardy, who, it is said, will be knighted at New Year's, said yesterday that the story was without foundation, and declared he was not opposed to Canadians receiving imperial titles when they are in recognition of public services and only bestowed for life. He did not think the bestowal of hereditary titles in Canada desirable.

MARRIED ABROAD.—The People's Press, of Albany, Linn County, Oregon, has the following account of the marriage of the daughter of a former resident of Souris: "Married on Tuesday, Nov 22nd, 1898, at the residence of the bride's parents, at Harrisburg, Oregon, Miss Oressa Maud Conroy, eldest daughter of Mr and Mrs S P Conroy, to Rev John Toukins, of Melama, Oregon. The ceremony was performed by Rev. Mr. Sperry, Baptist minister of Brownsville, and was short but impressive, the sacred vows being sealed by the placing of the wedding ring on the finger of the bride. The bride's dress was of light blue, trimmed in cream silk, while the groom was dressed in regular minister's robe. After the ceremony and congratulations from relatives and friends present, a splendid supper was served. On Wednesday morning the newly-married couple left for Portland on a wedding tour."

#### Lost at Sea—Captain and a Seaman Drowned.

### FRANCIS JOSEPH GRATEFUL.

#### Thanks His People for the Recent Demonstration in His Honor.

VIENNA, Dec. 15.—All over Vienna have been posted copies of the Imperial manifesto, thanking the nation for its demonstrations in honour of His Majesty's jubilee anniversary, as well as for its fifty years of steadfast allegiance.

Baron Banffy, the Hungarian Premier, is in Vienna. He has had a long conference with the Emperor, reporting on the grave situation induced by the resignation of Szilagy and Laog, President and Vice-President, respectively, of the Hungarian Reichstag, and by subsequent disorderly manifestations by the obstructionist Opposition. He also has been in conference with Minister-President, Count Colchowski, with Count Thun, the Austrian Premier, and with Baron de Kallay, but no decisive steps have been taken in development of the Ministerial crisis. Banffy reiterates that he enjoys to the fullest extent the Emperor's confidence. Erwin de Cseh has been appointed Minister for Croatia, Dalmatia, and Slavonia, in place of Herr Josipovich, who recently resigned.

#### Death to Dreyfus.

LONDON, Dec. 15.—The Daily News publishes a startling story of an alleged plot of the French league of patriots, numbering 300,000, under the notorious anti-revisionist, Mr Paul Deroulde, to prevent Dreyfus reaching Paris. They are alleged to have approached officers of high rank, which led to discovery of plot. The minister of war, it is stated, has decided on vigorous measures to suppress any such attempt.

#### A French Duel.

PARIS, Dec. 14.—M Antide Boyer, the Radical-Socialist Deputy, and M Daroulde, the Revisionist Deputy, fought a harmless duel with pistols yesterday at Tour de Villebon, near Meudon, as an outcome of yesterday's debate, during which M Daroulde and M Gauthier, another revisionist Deputy, challenged by M Boyer, referred to M Boyer as a "whitewashed Penamaist."
