## Canadians View De Gaulle With Both Hope And Anxiety

OTTAWA (CP)—Canadian reaction to Gen. Charles de Gaulle's bid for power is one of mingled hope and anxiety.

In Canada's view, the question is not so much whether France's wartime hero can be trusted, but rather what influences will operate most directly upon him.

Ending a 12-year "waiting game," the old soldier is making his thrust for power under the auspices of right-wing military and settler groups. Opinion in the capital attributes extremist views to these circles.

Another big question is what de Gaulle really stands for. "Nobody really knows except de Gaulle himself," was one comment.

MILDLY LIBERAL  
Several informants recalled that de Gaulle has a reputation as a mild liberal on colonial questions, based largely on his association with the Brazzaville declaration of 1945 which some regard as a far-sighted program for emancipation of colonial territories.

This gave the impression of the saucer "speeding off into the distance," Russell said.

"I have seen one in broad daylight and you can't work this balloon dodge then," he said.

NORAD HEAD IN OTTAWA  
OTTAWA (CP)—Gen. Earle Partridge, commander of North American Air Defence Command, will arrive here tonight for two days of conferences with Defence Minister Peakes and the chiefs of staff of the Canadian armed forces. It was understood that Gen. Partridge will bring Canadian military leaders up to date on air defence plans for North America.

Mr. Loiseleur spoke in the Commons throne speech debate during its eighth day. Most speakers participating read addresses extolling the attractions or wants of their particular constituencies.

He has shown himself to have a strong concept of French national interest and "grandeur," but his objectives may not wholly accord with those of his followers on the far right.

FEAR FOR ALLIANCES  
His accession to power would raise misgivings about his attitude to NATO, to European organization in political and trade affairs and to Western alliances generally.

But there is a sense of inevitability here a feeling that at this grave hour he must be the only possible man for France.

Some observers found comfort in the thought that it will be less dangerous for him to come to power by quasi-legal means than by some form of military coup.

And others drew comfort from the apparent caution with which de Gaulle is moving. This wariness, they said, makes it hard to believe that he harbors dictatorial ambitions.

## Suggests Montreal Island Become An Eleventh Province

OTTAWA (CP)—Montreal Island ought to be divorced from Quebec and made into an 11th province named Montreal, Gerard Loiseleur said Tuesday.

The Liberal Commons member for Montreal St. Ann said that would enable the metropolitan area to get ahead with much-needed public works programs.

GRIEVOUS LOSS  
The prime minister also said the death in Israel Monday of Lt.-Col. George Flint of Outremont, Que., is a grievous loss to the Canadian army and to the United Nations. Chairman of the UN Armistice Commission in Palestine, Col. Flint died under sniper fire while investigating an Israeli-Jordanian skirmish.

Opposition Leader Pearson and CCF spokesman H. W. Herdridge joined the prime minister in praising Col. Flint's bravery and conscientious service.

The opening question period left unanswered a query by Frank Howard (CCF - Skeena) that External Affairs Minister Smith reopen the matter of an exchange of parliamentary delegations between Canada and Russia. The proposal, made by Russia in 1956, appears to have died a natural death, he said.

Mr. Smith was out of town and a reply was left until his return. Mr. Loiseleur said that Montreal were a province it would not have to run to Quebec City every time it wanted to undertake a project.

He also asked Transport Minister Hees to intervene with the CNR to have the Railway use diesel instead of steam locomotives for cross-city runs. He had received assurances last year from CNR president Donald Gordon that diesels would replace steam engines, he said, but no apparent action had resulted.

HEAVY SUBSIDIES  
J. A. Richard (L.-S., Maurice-Lafloche) said the government ought to consider subsidies to municipalities having trouble with housing projects built under the National Housing Act. Projects involving multiple-dwelling units on streets serviced for single dwellings often meant costly outlays to increase utilities installations to meet the need.

As an anti-recession measure, Mr. Richard suggested that Finance Minister Fleming's next budget raise married taxpayers' basic income tax deductions to \$3,000 from \$2,000, and single persons to \$1,500 from \$1,000.

Vincent Brassard (PC—Chicoutimi) foresaw development of Quebec's Saguenay River valley as "a great Canadian Ruhr." Such a development, he said, would enable the processing of the valley's resources to Canada's benefit, rather than their export in raw state to the benefit of United States industry.

Martial Asselin (PC—Charlevoix) said improved rail, sea and air transportation is the key to development of the St. Lawrence River north shore. A first step should be a 275-mile extension of the CNR's Quebec Malbaie line

## Suspect Sub Off Brazil

RIO DE JANEIRO (AP)—A Brazilian destroyer has reported a suspected submarine near Rio de Janeiro, the navy ministry said Tuesday.

It said the destroyer made a suspicious instrument contact four successive times Monday, but that an investigation failed to turn up any trace of a sub. No depth charges were dropped.

Last week Argentine warships made a depth-charge attack on a mystery submarine off Argentina's southern coast. An oil slick was sighted later, leading to speculation that a sub might have been sunk or damaged.

The Argentine naval ministry Monday night cast doubt on that speculation. It said the submarine's periscope was sighted again 13 minutes after the oil slick appeared. Argentine patrol ships and planes then lost contact with the sub and there has been no further report on it.

Argentine officials said the submarine attacked apparently was a high-speed type. The United States, Britain and the Soviet Union all denied they had any submarines in the area.

## Speaks Against State Medicine

MONTEBELLO, Que. (CP)—Dr. Norman H. Gosse of Halifax, chairman of the general council of the Canadian Medical Association, said Tuesday the high standards of Canada's medical profession could not possibly have come about under a socialistic medical system.

He told the annual meeting of the Canadian Life Insurance Officers Association that free enterprise has given Canada as good a system and quality of medical care as can be found anywhere.

Dr. Gosse, for almost 40 years a member of the medical profession, said Canada has one doctor for each 1,000 population while in some countries where medicine has been socialized the ratio is one to 3,500.

He said socialized medicine also denies a doctor the privilege of setting up a practice wherever desired.

He criticized what he described as a tendency to demand that governments assume responsibility in hospital and sickness plans and a tendency in some departments of health to want to go along.

Facilities should be available for persons to insure against cost of illness, but this was a personal responsibility.

"Only for the financially incompetent is there a place for assumption of the cost by government."

## Toronto Star Control Goes To New Company

TORONTO (CP)—The Toronto Star Limited has completed transfer of the assets and control to a new company, Toronto Star Limited, it was announced Tuesday.

The new company is headed by Joseph S. Atkinson, who was president of the old Star company. The board of directors is also unchanged.

The Star says the only change involves dropping "the" from the old name.

The paper says the sale was made necessary by the Charitable Gifts Act, passed in 1949 by the Ontario legislature, which made it impossible to carry out the desire expressed by the late J. E. Atkinson in his will that his shares in The Star be held for the Atkinson Charitable Foundation.
