TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. NOTES FROM OTTAWA. Parliamentary Proceedings. PUBLIC ACCOUNTS ENQUIRY. Islanders on the Move.

OTTAWA, Sept. 29. In the House yesterday a number of bills were read a third time and passed. The supplementary estimates are all voted. The Public Accounts Committee held its last meeting yesterday. McKenzie Bowell stated that after he had learned from Barber that Senecal was exacting commissions he reported it to Sir John Macdonald, who informed Chapleau of what had transpired. Chapleau investigated, but Senecal was able to clear himself somehow. Sir John had, however, decided before his illness to enquire into the working of the Bureau. Crosby, of the Dominion Type Foundry, continued his previous evidence. Chapleau produced an affidavit from Senecal made in Buffalo, swearing that none of the moneys he received went to Chapleau. A vote of thanks was passed to Chapleau, the chairman of the committee. Parliament will prorogue to-morrow. All the preparations are made. Davies has gone to St. Paul. A. C. Macdonald went home on Sunday. Senator Howland goes to Boston first. Prowse will probably leave to-day. Montgomery and Andrew A. Macdonald go on Thursday.

Fishery Bulletin. (Fisheries Intelligence Bureau Report.) HALIFAX, Sept. 29.—Quebec—Cod fair at Perce, Newport Point and Paspobiac, but bait reported scarce at the latter. Boats arriving at Caraquet from P. E. I show good catches of codfish. P. E. Island—Shows a few cod caught at Georgetown, but fish of a kind scarce at other districts. Cape Breton—No reports of fish taken to-day. Nova Scotia—Herring reported plentiful, and the off shore cod and mackerel fisheries good at Lunenburg; cod and hake are fair, and mackerel are reported schooling off Port Medway. Bait—Squid are fair at Perce and Newport Point, Que.

Telegraphic News. TORONTO, Sept. 25.—Word has been received here that Capt. T. O. Bridgewater, one of the famous Balaclava six hundred, died recently at Clunricarde, Peterboro county, Ont. He died in poor circumstances, and a subscription had to be taken up to defray the expenses of the funeral.

BATHURST, Sept. 26.—The effects of the late fire will not be so damaging as was at first imagined by many. The St. Lawrence Lumber Co. say that they have sufficient sawn lumber on hand to fill all contracts and to load all ships chartered, and will still have a considerable quantity left over. They will probably rebuild during the winter.

QUEBEC, Sept. 27.—Ernest Pacaud arrived home yesterday by the Parisian, and although none of the ministers met him at the wharf as in former days this was only a blind, as the notorious boodler has been closeted almost ever since his arrival with Mercier and Langelier, his bosom friends. To a newspaper reporter Mr. Pacaud said: "Don't ask me for an interview on political matters, for you must understand that it is impossible for me to speak until I have thoroughly placed myself au fait in regard to the situation. You can say, however, that I am in excellent health and spirits and much improved since I left Quebec. I had a fine time across the water. We were in Paris from the 24th of August till the 3rd of September. We went from there to London where we stayed until the 16th, and then left for Liverpool to take the boat home. I am quite prepared to meet anything that may turn up."

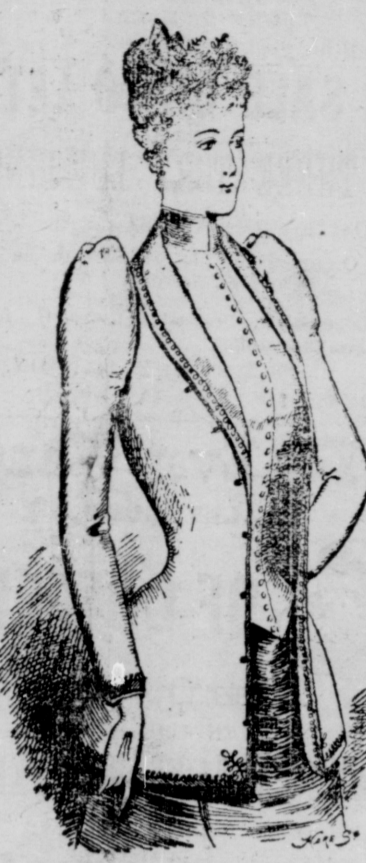
