Minnesota Twin's Oliva Heads For Top Of League

By BEN OLAN NEW YORK (AP) — Tony Oliva of Minnesota Twins, picking up the slack caused by an injury to slugger Harmon Killebrew, has also lifted himself to within striking distance of the American League batting lead. Oliva is the defending AL batting champion. He won the title as a rookie with a .321 average last season. A month ago, his chances of successfully defending his championship ap-

peared slim. His average on July 9 was .275. Boston Red Sox's Carl Yastrzemski was the leader with .340. Since then, Oliva has hit at a .385 pace, collecting 50 hits in 130 times at bat. He has raised his average 32 points to .307, climbed into a third-place tie with teammate Jimmy Hall and Baltimore Orioles' Brooks Robinson, and is only 15 points behind Yastrzemski. Yastrzemski slumped 16

points to .322 in last week's games, managing only three hits in 23 times at bat. MANTILLA SECOND Felix Mantilla of Boston is the runner-up with a .310 mark. He had five safeties in 17 tries last week, and his average did not change. San Francisco Giants' Willie Mays was the most productive batsman among National League leaders. He hit six homers, lifting his leading total to 30. In addition, he moved up from fourth place to second in batting on an overall showing of 14 hits in 30 tries. A .467 pace. This enabled him to gain 12 points to .328. Roberto Clemente of Pittsburgh Pirates, the pace-setter, increased his average two points to .343 with 10 hits in 27 at bats. Hank Aaron of Milwaukee Braves dropped one notch to third at .323. He collected nine hits in 29 trips. Deron Johnson of Cincinnati is the National League's runner-up in batting with 92. He drove in five runs last week. Rocky Colavito of Cleveland Indians paces the American League in RBI with 78. Colavito, Killebrew and Detroit's Willie Horton share the home run lead with 22.

Four Man Alberta Team Takes Eight Stroke Lead

By WALTER KREVENCHUK WINNIPEG (CP) — Alberta, led by a fine 70 by Keith Alexander of Calgary, took an eight-stroke lead over defending champion Saskatchewan Monday after 18 holes in the 36-hole Willingdon Cup interprovincial team golf matches. The four-man Alberta squad, searching for the province's third victory in the competition, compiled a 296 score to Saskatchewan's 304.

Ontario and Manitoba shared third place with 308, followed by British Columbia with 309, Quebec with 317, Nova Scotia 321, a combined New Brunswick - Prince Edward Island team with 323 and Newfoundland making its first appearance with 354.

English Jockey Piggott Looks For Third Ch'ship

By RON HOWARD LONDON (CP) — Wiry little Lester Piggott, a professional jockey since the age of 12, is aiming for his third British championship this season and nothing short of a serious injury seems likely to stop him. He was champ previously in 1960 and 1964.

By the beginning of August, Piggott, now 29, had booted home 95 winners on British tracks, 56 in the last half of July. He had also ridden more than 200 winners on foreign courses, including three triple-win days in the Irish Republic. He was leading his nearest rival by 24 wins.

Two of his finest and most profitable victories have been aboard Meadow Court, an Irish-bred three-year-old owned jointly by Calgary publisher Max Bell, Vancouver oilman Frank McMahon and singer Bing Crosby. Piggott scored the first Irish classic win of his career July 26 when he rode the chestnut colt to a two-length win in the £35,000 Irish Sweeps Derby. He followed that performance up three weeks later with another two-length win on Meadow Court in the £30,000 King George VI and Queen Elizabeth Stakes at Ascot. Earlier he earned £17,700 for a second-place ride in the Epsom Derby.

Described by Meadow Court's trainer Paddy Prendergast as a "great rider," the sallow-complexioned, 98-pounder usually brings odds tumbling on even the poorer class horses he agrees to ride. Meadow Court was odds-on favorite for both his wins this year. William Hill, one of London's biggest bookmakers, reckoned his firm lost more than £100,000 on Piggott's mounts during the five-day Royal Ascot meeting in mid-June when the crack rider rode eight winners, breaking the record of seven he had held jointly with Sir Gordon Richards.

P.E.I. Shooters Do Best Ever

Seventeen of twenty three members of the Island Rifle Team at the Dominion Matches qualified for the final stage of the Governor General's Match. This is the best performance any Island rifle team has ever done. The match is fired in three stages with three hundred competitors allowed in the final stage. Ten shots are fired 300 yards, 15 shots at 600 yards and 15 shots at 900 yards for a total of 200 points. High Islanders were Al Mutch with 192 in 14th place, Roy McCabe in 16th place with 191, Ron Clark 34th with 189, Harold Jones 82nd with 187 and George Rogers also with 187 in 87th place. Other high scorers were Eldon MacLean, Edgar Jones and Mike Susick with 186's.

In the Bisley Aggregate which includes most of the matches throughout the week, Mike Susick was high Islander in 21st place with 948. Edgar Jones 49th with 841, Roy McCabe 53rd with 840, Ronald Clark 54th with 840, Al Mutch 56th with 840 and Ralph Jenkins with 839 in 59th place. The top 18 competitors in the Bisley Aggregate are invited to compete in England in 1966 and because several qualifiers usually retire it is likely Mike Susick will win a place on the 1966 Bisley Team.

Piggott has won the Ascot Gold Cup four times, the Epsom Derby three times and has twice taken the British Oaks, THE 2,000 Guineas and the St. Leger Handicap. Prendergast has tentatively named him to ride Meadow Court in the York St. Leger at Doncaster, Yorkshire, Sept. 8 when Bell, McMahon and Crosby are all expected to be on hand. Piggott is descended from a long line of horsemen. His father Keith is a trainer and former jockey and his mother an experienced rider. His grandfather, Tom Cannon, rode his first winner at the age of nine and later went on to win the Grand National Steeplechase three times.

Piggott now lives with his wife Susan, 26, herself the daughter of a trainer, and their four-year-old daughter, Maureen, in a rambling Suffolk home near Newmarket, the seat of the Jockey Club. There will be a practice for the Islanders Track club this evening at Memorial Field. Jack Kane has called the practice and all athletes are asked to be on hand at 6:30.
