A STEAMER SOLD.—The Island Farmer is informed that Messrs. Joseph Read & Co. have received the contract of running the Summerside-Bedouque ferry, and in consequence they have purchased the steamer Frank C. Batt.

DROWNING ACCIDENT.—During a storm on Lake Ontario, on Friday last, the yacht Idler capsized. Her crew evidently were drowned, as no trace can be found of them. It is not known where the yacht hailed from or how many composed her crew.

EASTER SERVICE.—The Womens Missionary Society of the Methodist Brick Church, assisted by a representative from Zion Church, and a special choir, will hold a public Easter Service in their schoolroom, on Friday evening the 11th inst., at 7.30.

VALUABLE MARES.—The sale at "Binstead" (2 1/2 miles from Charlottetown) on Monday next will be an important date as the eight horses will positively be sold. The Carey mares have been the prize winners year after year at the exhibitions. Also, 15 milch cows and 28 sheep, and other stock.

MILITARY EXPENDITURE.—The military expenditure of the great powers during the past three years is as follows: France, 5,092,000,000 marks; Russia, 3,254,000,000 marks; Great Britain, 2,475,000,000 marks; Austria-Hungary, 1,352,000,000 marks; Italy, 1,254,000,000 marks.

DISASTROUS HURRICANES.—Severe hurricanes on the Pacific during March have caused many disasters on the coasts of New Hebrides. Several ships were wrecked at Lobom. A vessel grounded at Mallico and five whites and thirty natives were drowned, while thirty others who reached the shore were massacred by the natives.

THE ST. JULIAN SOLD OUT.—A Halifax despatch says: The household furniture, liquors, etc., of the St. Julian hotel, were sold by the sheriff on Saturday, for \$116. The proprietor, J. P. Marr, has skipped. He fitted up the most gorgeous bar-room and small hotel in this part of Canada. He ran it six months and then collapsed. There are claims against him for \$17,000 in addition to mortgages.

A VALUABLE DISCOVERY.—There is considerable excitement at North Plainfield, N. J., over the discovery of copper and silver ores in the mountains back of the town. The discovery was made in excavating for water works, and it is said that investigation has been made to warrant the assertion that, underlying the outer layers of trap rock and red sands one in the mountain, are mines from which fortunes may be developed.

A PECULIAR WILL.—The will of a prominent attorney in Cincinnati is a peculiar document, and two of the provisions have attracted considerable comment. "I desire that no bar meeting be held for me, for such occasions are utilized by lawyers to explode their eloquence without cause. I desire that no grape be worn by my family for me, but if any member chooses to do so the same shall be charged to his account."

DOMINION PARLIAMENT

Summary of Proceedings.

OTTAWA, April 9.

Mr. Jones, of Halifax, inquired when the amended Intercolonial freight tariff would be laid before the House.

Sir John Macdonald said it would be submitted in a few days. Since the new tariff was agreed on there had been a great many applications for modification and due consideration had been given these.

Before the orders of the day were proceeded with Sir John Macdonald made a feeling reference to the death of Mr. Chisholm, M. P. for New Westminster.

The House then went into committee on the tariff resolutions. The explanatory clauses were adopted with slight verbal alterations. The changes in the tariff came next, the first noteworthy discussion being on this item, animals living, viz: cattle, sheep and hogs, 30 per cent. ad valorem.

The debate on this item was undisturbed when the House adjourned at midnight.

Laid to Rest.

QUEBEC, April 9.

Hon. Sheriff Chauveau was interred in the vaults of the chapel of the Ursuline Convent. No other lay interment will take place there in future save that of Narcisse Belleau, who has expressed the desire of being interred by the side of his wife.

Afterwards, none but Sisters will have their last resting place in the chapel where lie the remains of the last French generation in Canada.

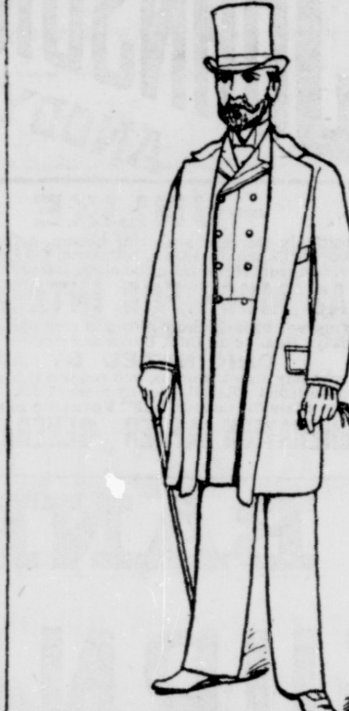
