MR. ROBERT P. BELL, the American lawyer-journalist who after three years residence is giving his illustrated lecture on South Africa, "Land of the Briton and Boer," will appear at the Opera House Monday evening. During his residence in South Africa Mr. Bell made extensive visits to all parts of Cape Colony, Orange Free State, Natal and the Transvaal, and to Salisbury, Umtali, Mashonaland and Bulawayo in Matabele land, also to Mafeking and many other points which have been made interesting since the outbreak of hostilities. Mr. Bell, as an Uitlander underwent all the annoyances and indignities which were accorded his class by the Boer officials and describes graphically the means used by the government of the Transvaal to oppress and harass all Uitlander business enterprise. The Boer in his home life will be pictured as well as the manner in which the natives are abused. All in all the lecture promises to be most entertaining, instructive and interesting, and the people of Charlottetown may well follow the example of those in Halifax and turn out in numbers Monday evening. The plan of reserved seats is now open at the usual places.
