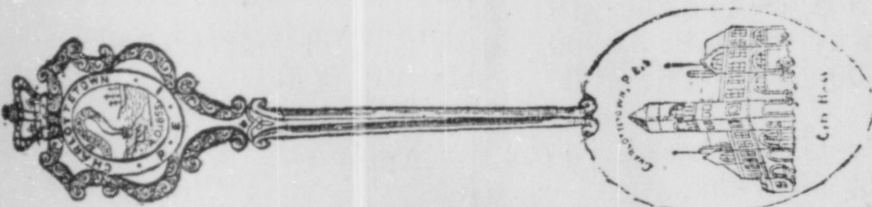

The British Capture Bethlehem.

HAD A LIVELY SCRAP BEFORE TAKING THE TOWN.

Baden-Powell Reaches Rustenburg—All Quiet There

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

LONDON, July 11.—Lord Roberts has sent two despatches to the War Office:

"PRETORIA, July 10.—Clements' and Paget's forces entered Bethlehem July 7. The former on nearing the town sent in a flag of truce demanding its surrender which was refused by Dewet, when Paget making a wide turning movement succeeded in getting hold of the enemy's most important position—covering the town. This was carried before dark by the Munster Fusiliers and Yorkshire Light Infantry. "The following morning the attack was continued, and by noon the town was in our possession and the enemy in full retreat.

"Our casualties were 4 officers and 32 men from Munster's wounded, Captains MacPherson and Woakes and Lieutenant Conway severely, and Lieut Boyd Rochfort, Scotch Rifles, slightly wounded. Seven men of the the Yorkshire Regiment wounded, one killed. Two wounded of wounded of the Imperial Yeomanry.

"Paget reports that but for the accurate practice of the 38th Royal Artillery and Fourth City Imperial Batteries the casualties would have been many more.

"Baden-Powell reached Rustenburg, July 8, without opposition. He found all quiet there and the public confidence entirely satisfactory, thanks to the prompt and bold grasp of the situation taken by Major Hanbury Tracey.

"The district west of this is somewhat unsettled, owing to the small force which attacked Rustenburg being still in the neighborhood. Measures are being taken to meet this.

"PRETORIA, July 10.—Further information regarding the capture of Bethlehem, has been received from General Clements. General Clements attacked. One position assailed by General Clements was gallantly captured by the Royal Irish who captured a gun of the 77th battery, lost at Stromberg.

"Hunter's cavalry, under Broadwood, reached Bethlehem, July 8. Hunter, with his main force, was within nine miles of the town when General Clements dispatched his report."

LONDON, July 11.—The Daily Telegraph this morning says it understands that on the termination of the war in South Africa Sir George Goldie will be appointed governor of Cape Colony, Sir Alfred Milner, who now holds both the governorship and High Commissionership of South Africa simply retaining the latter office.

A despatch from Lorenzo Marques says: A Boer bulletin has been issued asserting that the Boers have captured Waterval.

CHARGED WITH FORGERY,

Leading Citizen of St. John in the Toils,

ST. JOHN, July 11.—Fred S. Whitaker, Marine Insurance agent, and one of St. John's most prominent citizens, has been taken into custody at the instance of the bank of New Brunswick, charged with uttering forged paper bearing the name of J. M. Smith, of Windsor, N. S., S. A. Crowell & Co., Yarmouth, and Charles D. W. Smith, Windsor.

Whitaker was taken into custody several days ago at the instance of the bank, but the matter was kept quiet as it was believed there would be a settlement. However the court proceedings now being held make this impossible or at least improbable.

At first it was said the amount at stake was about \$18,000. But day by day this has been increased, and it is now said the sum of \$50,000 will not meet the deficiencies.

As yet Whitaker has not been called upon to plead; but it is understood that he will be arraigned this morning.

LETTER FROM MR. T. A. McLEAN

The Patriot Floored—Waked Up the Wrong Passenger at Cornwall.

SIR,—The Patriot of yesterday calls in question my statement at Cornwall meeting and reports me incorrectly,—not intentionally, of course, as it was as near the statement as that paper ever got yet to what had been said during this campaign.

What I did say at Cornwall, was that the removal of Newson's Hill, at that time, was simply highway robbery, that the actions of Claud Duval, Sixteen-String Jack and Dick Turpin were gentlemanly and honest compared with the present management of this roadway, as those men manfully and before your face took the money and only then from the people who were rich,—but the Government were using the highway to rob the whole people. You can call it hoodluming or what you will. It is not honest. The statement of the 16 carts is true; or if the Patriot or anybody else demands that I substantiate this statement that 16 carts were employed on three chains of a cut on a hill, the cut of which is not 30 feet wide, I am prepared to go into court and prove it, the timekeeper of the job to the contrary notwithstanding, as my witnesses will be greater even than the timekeeper and more of them. The statement is too true, gentlemen of the Patriot. That is why it was singled out on the eve of the election to prevent this reply reaching the people before the day. I have had similar experiences of the Patriot in days gone by, in civic contests. It always showed the cloven foot the night before the battle. This statement I can also prove.

The fact that my own farmers were employed with horse and cart confirms my statement still further of wrong doing—as it is a well known fact that only at election times will a Tory cart get any hauling to do. Besides, the men were induced to refrain from voting by a \$25 bribe being held out to them. If the Patriot doubts this statement, the proof will be forthcoming.

LATEST NEWS OF CHINESE TROUBLE

Japan Will Land a Force in China

SHE HAS AN UNDERSTANDING WITH OTHER POWERS

The Campaign Will Extend Over Two or Three Years.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

BERLIN, July 11.—The Foreign Office has informed the Associated Press that all the powers have consented to Japan landing a force in China—but the stipulation was made before-hand that no power could derive an advantage territorially from the fact of its having more troops in China than others.

The Japanese Government has expressed its perfect willingness to send troops under these terms.

LONDON, July 11.—A Chefoo correspondent telegraphing yesterday Tuesday says: The Japanese forces are equipped 36 heavy mortars and 120 field guns, and have pontoon and balloon sections.

The plan of campaign contemplates operations extending two or three years.

A further force of 13,000 men will be landed at Taku a week hence and an additional 10,000 soon afterwards.

Before the rainy season is well advanced Japan hopes to have 63,000 troops in China.

These formidable preparations are viewed with great distrust by Russia, Germany and France.
