

DOWN THE BACK STRETCH

Harness racing has been going strong in the Maritimes this season with some twenty tracks giving meetings and Truro, Sydney and Charlottetown two meetings weekly. The biggest events are yet to come, such as the Diamond Jubilee meet at Moncton, Old Home Week at Charlottetown, Exhibition week at Truro, Fredericton and North Sydney, and one-day meets in many other centres. But this is nothing new in the Maritimes. In 1920 the largest crowd that ever attended a race meeting at Sydney, N.S., turned out on Victoria Day, May 24th. There was an unfortunate incident to mar the day's sport, however, Ollie Rudderham, owner and driver of Annie Laurie being seriously injured just before the start of his race. The Free For All Trot and Pace was won by Jennie Frisco (Hood) with 1-4-1, best time 2:22 1/4.

At Truro May 24th, two thousand and people turned out to witness the racing there. The Free For All was won by Prince Albert (Archibald), and at Glace Bay, May 24, a crowd of upwards of 4,000 enjoyed the races. The Free For All was won by Vanza (Lewis) best time 2:21. At Moncton, July 3rd, the Free For All was won by John A. Hal (J. Boutiller) best time 2:11 1/4, and at Fredericton the same day Fern Hal (F. Cameron) won the Free For All in 2:15 1/4. At Woodstock, July 13, the big event was the Free For All which was won by Ore Fino (Hanahan) with 5-1-1. The Problem 1-2-3-2, four other starters, best time 2:11 by Ore Fino, 2:03 1/4. He had been purchased by a syndicate of Woodstock sportsmen from parties in Readville, Mass.

At Fredericton, July 27th, sensational racing marked the opening of the fourth meeting of the Maine and Maritime Circuit with Blanche H. (Willard) establishing a new record for the Fredericton Driving Park track by pacing the first heat of the day in 2:14, displacing the former record of 2:11 1/4 held jointly by Adio Guy 2:00 1/4 and Bob Mac 2:14. Other winners that day were, Togio Mac (Hanahan) and College Swift (Hanahan). The following day the St. John-owned pacer Peter Farren 2:07 1/4 (Brickley) caused an awful upset by winning the \$1,000 Barker House Free For All purse and knocking the track record made by Blanche H. to smithereens, his first heat being in 2:09 1/4 and his second in 2:08 1/4; Fern Hal (Cameron) won the third heat in 2:12 1/4 and Peter Farren the fourth heat and race in the same time.

On the third day of the meeting, July 29th, which was considered to be the greatest ever held in Lower Canada, the feature race being the battle royal between the five-year-old Maritime bred, stallion Bill Sharen (P. Carroll) and the recently imported stallion The Exposer 2:08 1/4 (H. Jewett-F. Cameron), the duel being staged after Brage (Boutiller) had won the first in 2:11 1/4—a reduction of nearly three seconds off the former track trotting record of 2:14 1/4. It only stood for about thirty minutes when Bill Sharen came right back with a 2:11 1/4 mile in his third heat. Among the other winners that day was Corwin Hal, owned by John P. Smith, Kinkora, and driven by Dannie Steele, best time 2:15 1/4.

The following week the Free For All at St. Stephen was won by the Maine owned pacer The Ghost (Pottier) in straight heats, best time 2:11 1/4. The September 14th meet at Woodstock was one of the best ever held there, high class horses and great racing. The Free For All was won by the Maine owned star Zom Q. (Nevers) with Fern Hal going a dead heat with him in the second and fastest—2:14 1/4. Charlottetown's Exhibition meet which commenced on the 28th of September and ran to October 2nd was a real speed festival with the best horses in the Maritimes and the John Willard 2:16 Trot was won by Bill Sharen (Carroll) in three straight heats, best time 2:14 1/4; Colorado L. (H. Kelly) 2-3-2. The 225 Pace, First Division, was won by Dick C. (MacKinnon) in straight heats, best time 2:16 1/4. The 225 Pace Second Division was won by Northern Mac (Willard) in straight heats, best time 2:17 1/4. The 230 Trot was won by the high class imported trotter Miss Belle Rico, owned and driven by W. B. MacArthur, Kensington, in straight heats; Bingen Worrier (Hood) 2-3-3; six other starters. The 211 Pace was won by Fern Hal in straight heats, White Sox (MacKinnon) 4-2-2. The 230 Trot was won by Orville Belle, driven by Johnny McCabe, with 1-2-3-1-1, Roy Miller (MacKinnon) 4-1-1-2-2, best time 2:18 1/4. The 225 Trot was won by the British Soldier (MacKinnon) with 1-1-1, Orville Belle

Large Crowd Witness Keen Racing; Another Big Program Tonight

It was another smart racing card that was witnessed by a large crowd of fans at the Exhibition Raceway last night when a large field of sixty-nine horses battled it out over a perfect track in a program of ten classy one-mile dash events that presented plenty of keen racing action in both pace and trot divisions.

Another big program will get underway at the same track again tonight when a large field of entirely different horses will see action in a promising looking ten-dash card. Charlottetown's veteran reinsman, Lt.-Col. D. A. MacKinnon was one of the leading drivers of the meet when he piloted Louis MacLeod's Mary T. Clegg, to straight wins in the fourth and eighth races on the card, and chalked up his third winning performance of the night with Lusty's Queen in the second dash event.

Lorne Letcher of Springhill, Nova Scotia, continued his fine performance here this season when he cooped off the other double win of the evening with his own sleek pacer entry A. G. Scott in winning both the sixth and tenth dashes. He also was the driver of the fastest mile when he guided A. G. Scott to a mile in 2:11 3-5 in the number six event.

Dean Swift, Bud Abner, Ramona Peters, Eleanor G. and Neil Kalmuck were the other race winners during the night's racing. The program was one of startling upsets and driving finishes at the wire which resulted in some excellent payoffs for lucky bettors. Coming through with an unexpected victory in the third dash, Bud Abner, owned and driven by Cyril Smith of Hurdle River, was the second half of the winning ticket on the daily double with Lusty's Queen, who won the second event, to pay handsomely to the amount of \$256.70. The Abner horse also paid \$27.20 to win and \$13.90 to place, while in the fifth race on the card, Eleanor G. paid \$24.60 to win and \$10.00 to place. Lusty's Queen paid \$13.20 and \$8.00.

Ed Wood, Pownal, Queens County, the Province's top crowd shooter, blazed his way over the top in spite of stiff opposition to win the coveted three shot Savage automatic shotgun donated by R. T. Hockan, Ltd. with a score of 367 crows. Two other Queens county men, Frank Longaphie, Charlottetown, and John Worth, Pownal, groped their way close on his heels through the smoke screen he laid down but never succeeded in breaking out in front . . . maybe the smoke got in their eyes.

Ed deserved to win the prize. He is by a wide margin P.E.I.'s premier crowd shooter. He has for years had good sport hunting crows and besides keeping his shooting eyes in trim has done his bit toward saving the young and eggs of our upland game birds and ducks. Besides being a crack wing shot he is an expert crow caller and can play "The Dead March In Saul" on a crow call in a way that has startled many a black scavenger on the road that leads to oblivion. Last season he shot over 100 crows just to keep in trim.

Now I'm not going to make any claim that the winner of the Savage automatic shot all the 337 crows himself, although he accounted for the bulk of them, as several of his shooting pals accompanied him on some of his hunts. His best score was 22 in a two hour shoot one morning beginning at daybreak. He was on his own that morning and was back to the farm in time to place a milk pail between knees. Twenty-two crows in two hours shot on wing coming in to a crow call takes some beating.

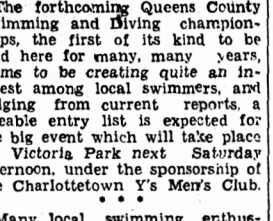
The only contestant that I know who really shot all the crows himself and refused to offer of feet shot by others was Connie Gallant, Armdale, Kings County with a score of 111 . . . not just eleven as previously reported in the local press. As far as I can ascertain Jack Worth, Pownal, was pretty much on his own. His score was 303. Worth put in a lot of time on the contest but was handicapped by the amount of space around a crow . . . believe me he wasn't the only contestant who run up against this space trouble.

That the contest was a success was due to the showing put on by the Queens County branch of the Association. Out of a total 1683 crows shot or trapped sportsmen from Queens turned in 1991 Kings 178 and Prince 14.

As announced in the local press at the beginning of the week Edward Wood, Pownal, won the grand prize with a total of 367 pairs of feet. Frank Longaphie, Charlottetown, John Worth, Pownal, and Harold Jenkins, Charlottetown, qualified for first, second and third county prizes with scores of 324-303 and 150 respectively. Roy Campbell, Nine Mile Creek, pushed Jenkins close with a score of 141. Archie Auld, Winslow, with 56 pairs of feet was the next closest competitor. All told there were 18 contestants entered from Queens county; six from Kings and one from Prince.

Connie Gallant, Armdale, easily led all competitors in Kings county with a score of 111. Earl Cop, Bangor was second with 24 and Edward A. Mallard, Goway Brae was third with 16. Kings County sportsmen are to be congratulated on the showing they made. The Kings County branch is not much over a month old and is looked upon as the baby of the Provincial Association. Prince County branch had one lone entrant, John MacGougan, Malpeque. Heopped the first county prize for Prince, a three-shot 20 gauge Mossberg shotgun, presented by Island Pheasants Unlimited with 14 crows. It is rumored at time of writing that Mr. MacGougan is a member of the Prince County branch, or was on July 15th, 1950.

When this columnist predicted a kill in excess of two thousand crows a couple of weeks ago I expected that the western sportsmen would pull their share and contribute at least 500 crows to the pot. Alas they disappointed this columnist along with a host of others. Most of us expected better things from the Prince County branch. They made quite a splash when they formed their own County Association two years ago. Among the new ideas was the appointment of their own branch game wardens. However when the test came that required action rather than words they allowed the infant Kings county branch to beat them by a mile.



The forthcoming Queens County Swimming and Diving championships, the first of its kind to be held here for many many years, seems to be creating quite an interest among local swimmers, and judging from current reports, a sizeable entry list is expected for the big event which will take place off Victoria Park next Saturday afternoon, under the sponsorship of the Charlottetown Y's Men's Club.

Many local swimming enthusiasts, contemplating taking part in the meet, have been taking full advantage of the opportunity afforded them by Mr. Wally Sharpe, who for the past week or more has been giving free coaching and instruction classes at Brighton Beach. Mr. Sharpe, a former Canadian record holder of a number of swim events, is very pleased with the turnout and enthusiasm shown by the local swimmers, and feels that the progress being made is highly encouraging and satisfactory.

For the benefit of those who are not in the immediate City area, but are eligible and planning to take part in next Saturday's competitions, entry forms may be obtained at the Travel Bureau and that entries may also be handed in or mailed to that office. Any other details of the meet may also be obtained there or from Mrs. Harry Cudmore at the Red Cross. But remember, all entries for the meet close on Thursday night of next week, so if you want to be able to take part, get your entry in as soon as possible.

With the Queens County meet, as well as other corresponding County meets to be held next month, in conjunction with the forthcoming Provincial Meet at Summerside on August 31st, it looks very much like the art of swimming is coming back to its own on P. E. I. as a leading athletic competitive feature, and not just an individual pastime. It is a great idea and it is hoped that contestants, fans and officials will enjoy every success in the venture.

Doug Saunders of the Charlottetown Golf Club really did himself proud here on Thursday night when he set a new amateur record for the Belvedere course, driving and putting his way over the 18-hole course for a net 68, one stroke better than the previous record held jointly by Maurice Dowling, also of the local Club, and Dr. E. O. Turner of Fredericton, N. B.
