**Provincial Legislature.**  
**House of Assembly.**  
**SUMMARY OF PROCEEDINGS.**

TUESDAY, April 18.

Hon. Mr. Peters submitted a bill respecting the Court of Chancery. He explained that the bill authorized the Chief Justice to sit in chancery on cases in which the other judges cannot sit. It was read a first time, read a second time, committed and reported agreed to.

Mr. Montgomery submitted a bill (from Council) entitled an Act (from Council) to amend the process, practice and mode of pleading in the Supreme Court of Judicature of Prince Edward Island.

Mr. McDonald asked the Commissioner of Public Works if a petition has been received from the inhabitants of Middleton, Lot 60, Rana, Caledonia and other adjoining settlements, praying for the opening of a new road from the Millard Road to the new extension of the Halket Road, and if so, what action does the Government intend to take with reference to said petition; also, if a petition had been received from the inhabitants of Flat River, Melville and adjoining settlements praying for the opening of a new road from the Wood Island Road to the shore of Flat River, or Johnson's Beach, and if so, what action do the Government intend to take with reference to the prayer of said petition, and if any amount has been subscribed for the said road by the inhabitants, and if so, what amount?

Hon. Mr. McLean replied that the petitions had been read, and the matters referred to would be carefully investigated. In regard to the last question, he said that about two hundred dollars had been subscribed.

Mr. Montgomery moved the following resolution:

Resolved, That the Government take the necessary steps to obtain from the Industrial Exhibition Association of Queen's, King's and Prince Counties, vouchers for their expenditures for the years 1891 and 1892, so far as relates to the Government subsidy and supplement added thereto.

Mr. Bell seconded the motion, and announced upon alleged discrepancies in statements concerning the Prince County Exhibition, and urged that an inquiry be instituted.

Mr. Shaw supported the motion, which was carried.

House then went into committee on road scales.

Agreed to.  
Mr. Bentley called attention to the fact that the cost of the road machine and the expense in connection with it had not yet been made known, though he had asked for it on the 16th day of March. Over a month has elapsed. What can be the reason that the information is not brought down? The Government are not inclined to do justice in this matter as in many other matters. The withholding of this information leads to suspicion that all is not right. There must be something dark and underhand in connection with the matter seeing that the Government are so loth to give the information required to the public.

Hon. Mr. McLean stated that the statements asked for involved a large amount of research and labor. In the future it is intended that the machines shall be operated in connection with statute labor. It has been found that a great saving has been made by the use of the machine. He hoped to get returns of last year by this evening.

Mr. Bentley said that the reply was unsatisfactory.

Mr. Arsenault considered it a very queer thing that information was not forthcoming. What is to be gained by hiding the facts—unless there is something to be hidden?

House took recess.

**Literary Notes.**

Roginald de Koven's new waltz, which one hears played on so many pianos nowadays, has proved so popular with young ladies' Home Journal, containing the music, has been found necessary, the first edition of the magazine consisting of 700,000 copies.

Following Mr. Howell's lead, apparently, both Frank R. Stockton and Mrs. Frances Hodgson Burnett have gone over to the Ladies' Home Journal, and the most important works by these authors upon which they are now engaged, will shortly see publication in this magazine.

The British Columbia Legislature has appropriated \$800,000 for new capital buildings.

Minnesota raises a revenue of a million a year from a tax on the gross earnings of its railroads, and the calculation is made that in a few years the increase of this tax on the levy upon mining properties will provide the state with all its revenue and lessen or entirely abolish the necessity of levying any tax for school purposes.

Prof. Harris of Cambridge, has reported to Prof. Neale, at Tubingen, that a palimpsest containing the complete Syrian text of the four gospels has been discovered in the convent of Mt. Sinai. Hitherto only fragments of the Syrian text have been known. This text is the oldest authenticated text of the gospels in existence.

The Montreal City Council is asked to pass a resolution approving of the principle of Home Rule for Ireland. The Gazette comments that having made such a brilliant success in managing their own affairs the aldermen will naturally expect a great deal of attention to be paid to what they say about directing those of the United Kingdom.

Statistics show that the foreign trade of China for 1892 amounted to £277,684,000, and increase over 1891 of £2,730,000.

Quiet has been fully restored in Santiago, Chili, and all parties are now awaiting the announcement of the new cabinet.

According to the latest count the Democrats have 220, the Republicans 127 and the third party 8 representatives in the U. S. Congress, giving the Democrats a majority over all of 85.

A colored school house near Robinsonville, Miss., was blown down on Wednesday morning and 25 children were killed. There were also a number of negroes killed in the town.

The Seattle Post-Intelligencer thinks the McKinley Bill is a thorn in Canada's side, and if the Democrats repeal it there will cease to be anything heard of annexation among Canadians. The Post-Intelligencer has evidently learned its lesson from the Canadian Liberal press.

The events of Wednesday last were against the Government, both in Toronto and Vaudreuil. They were not so much against the Government, however, as the chief movers in them will be against each other if they ever come together in active as they are now in practical alliance. Mr. McCarthy's anti-french, anti-Catholic speech is more opposed to Mr. Laurier's Manitoba school policy than either Mr. Laurier or Mr. McCarthy can well be to their common enemy, the Thompson Government.

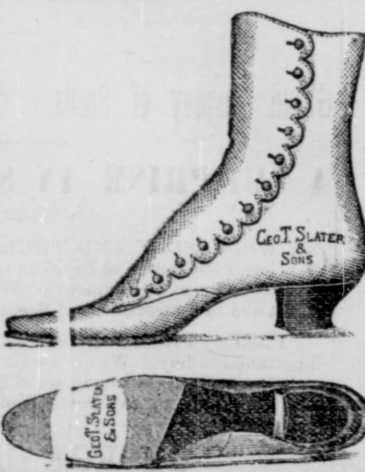
