

Sales Tax Removed From Side Light Dept. Fuel

The repeal of a Federal Government sales tax paid by the owners of Sammamish on fuel oil used in production of electricity at the town-owned Electric Light Department was announced by Councilor Dr. H.E. Clark, chairman of the Electric Light Department, in a report made to the council at a special meeting last evening attended by all council members.

Councilor Clark's report also included accounting changes and reasons for a recent revision of the department's financial establishments.

Reports by other committee chairmen included the annual report by Councilor Edgar Cannon of the water and sewerage department, and the report made to the council by Douglas Bras and Jones, whose tender was the lowest on bids submitted for enlarging a well near the electric light plant on Harvard Street to ten inches in diameter, and he intimated that that a submersible deep-well pump would be installed.

Councilor Cannon also revealed that the cost of air in the water supply from the Harvard Street line.

In connection with the action to improve the pumping facility, a stand-by pump presently located at the well just enlarged near the electric light plant will be moved to a pumping capacity.

Councilor Leo Wood chairman of the streets committee said that the city's new dump has been widened, rebuilt, and is being resurfaced with concrete.

He said drainage in the ditches beside the road has been improved and extended right to the shore.

Town manager Joe Brophy commented on the improvements made in the care of the town dump, where a sanitary landfill method of burying refuse was being used, through use of the large bulldozer owned by the city.
