

Local and Other Items.

THE Rev. Geo. W. Hodgson has gone to Georgetown.

THE Northern Light has not yet arrived at Georgetown.

THE mails arrived in this city shortly after 4 p. m. to-day.

PARSELL sailed from New York for England on the 11th inst.

THE first party of emigrants of this season arrived at Winnipeg on the 8th inst.

ELDER D. CRAWFORD will preach in the Christian Meeting House, Upper Great George Street, to-morrow, both forenoon and evening.

A six-day walking match between O'Leary and Weston, for \$5,000 a side, was begun in San Francisco at 1 a. m., on the 8th. O'Leary is now leading.

A Paris correspondent says that the Government, in case of the defeat of article 7 of Ferry's education bill, will enforce all laws now existing against the Jesuits with the utmost possible rigor.

DESPATCHES from London say the news from Ireland is of the most encouraging nature; the measures taken by the different relief committees have been successful beyond expectations, and Connemara is the only district where there is still severe suffering.

PARSELL visited Toronto on Saturday last, and addressed a large audience in the Royal Opera House in what the Toronto Globe calls a "modest, sensible and gentlemanly speech," void of vituperation. He received a good hearing, and was followed by Dillon and two local speakers. On Monday and Tuesday Parnell addressed meetings in Montreal.

SLACKNESS of work in Europe and its abundance in America has induced the weavers' trades unions in England to set apart in their trades societies a certain part of their funds to assist those who desire to emigrate to America. Among the Macclesfield weavers this amounts to six tickets per week, and these are largely sought and balloted for.

THE PRINCESS LOUISE AND CANADA.—A letter in a United States paper contains the following: Mr. Sullivan had just been visiting the Princess Louise at Government House, and said that she had begged him to contradict the report that she did not wish to return to Canada. She loves it, and came back with enthusiasm. He bears the universal testimony to her simple, sincere, fine character, her excellent mind, and the wide culture and many interests which enliven her life.

The councillor took no action in the matter.

HANLAN, on the 4th inst., received a letter from Fleming, Sydney, N. S. W., enclosing a letter from Trickett, addressed to that gentleman, in which Trickett expresses his willingness to meet Hanlan for a championship race in England on the Thames, for £200 a side, provided he (Trickett) can dispose of his business and go to England. It will not pay Hanlan to go to England for any such errand, unless Trickett challenges him for the cup. He has to win again the \$5,000 purse, attend to his new hotel, and possibly have a try for the other \$5,000.

A MONKTON tender, that of Messrs. Archibald McKay and G. R. Elliott, for the construction of 60 flat and 60 box cars for the Canada Pacific, has been accepted and the requisite deposit, about four thousand dollars, was put up on the 10th inst. Messrs. Jonathan Weir and E. A. Record are interested in the contract, and the work will be done in Monkton. The whole value of the work is said to be between eighty and ninety thousand dollars.—It is to be hoped that this will be the beginning of extensive carbuilding here.—Monkton Times.

DURING the first six months of the current fiscal year, the Dominion imported over \$7,000,000 worth of goods less, than for the same period last year, and exported nearly \$8,000,000 worth more than for the same period last year. Thus, for the first half of our first Protected fiscal year, we find ourselves \$15,000,000 better off than we would have been under jugged free trade. It will not take very long under this policy to change the balance of trade in our favor.—Halifax Herald.

NOVA SCOTIA GOLD FIELDS.—Messrs. J. R. Robinson & Co., of Halifax, have just shipped a bar of 370 ounces of gold to New York from the Rose Lead at Montague, N. S., the result of their first crushing, from 90 tons quartz. Messrs. Robinson recently purchased this mine for \$50,000. New crushers and other machinery have been erected. This time last year there were only two men working at Montague; there are now about 80 men employed, and over \$50,000 worth of gold has been taken out of the two mines, viz., the Symonds and the Rose within the last nine months. Preparations are now being made by others owning property in this vicinity, for its development in the spring, and the coming summer will probably see several hundred men working them.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

Special Dispatch to the Examiner.

OTTAWA, March 12.

The House met at 3.20 p. m. A petition against the deceased Wife's Sister Bill was presented from Ontario.

Resolutions were introduced, at the instance of the Public Accounts Committee, asking the Senate to furnish detailed statements of expenditure on account of the indemnity to Senators last year.

The Senate, by message, informed the House that they had passed the Bill respecting the Insolvent Act without amendment.

The House then passed the orders of the day, receiving the report of the committee of ways and means. McKenzie having the floor, criticised Tupper's speech on the Budget resolutions. He declared that the sugar duties were arranged so as to prevent Ontario from having sugar refineries, while monopolists in Montreal and other monopolists in Halifax and St. John had full swing. He objected to the Government discriminating against one Province. He endeavored to show that the National Policy had in the matter of sugar created a few millionaires at the expense of the country.

Rykert followed, defending the National Policy, and declaring that the people were rallying to the support of that Policy. He cited instances to show the favor with which the Policy is received throughout the country.

Recess.
The House met in the evening. Eleven political bills were advanced a stage. Rykert then took the floor and, in the style for which he is famous, criticised the speeches of Cartwright and MacKenzie in a speech of about two hours' length. He was followed by Ross of Middlesex.

LONDON, March 12.

Mr. Gladstone in speaking at Marylebone announced that Lord Derby had definitely joined the Liberal Party.

A Candahar special says that reports brought in by spies say that Mohammed Jan's following is increasing enormously, and his agents are recruiting in all directions.

A fire at Zadworze, Austria destroyed 25 houses and five people were killed.

Mr. Lowell, Minister from the United States, presented his credentials to the Queen at Buckingham Palace yesterday.

It is stated that Prince William, the eldest son of the Crown Prince, will shortly be betrothed to the Princess Caroline Mathilda, daughter of the Duke of Schleswig-Holstein.

The Assessment of Real and Personal Property.

THE City Council met on Friday evening for the purpose of further considering "the By-law to assess real and personal property." On taking the chair in Committee, Councillor Beer read the following amendment—of Mayor Dawson—to the obnoxious By-law:—

"That application be made to the Local Legislature to pass an Act empowering the City Council to issue debentures to cover the present overdraft, and a sum sufficient to meet the contemplated expenditure up to July next."

Councillor Murphy made an able speech in favor of the resolution. It was, he said, the only means by which the corporation could get out of the present difficulty. Had he a working majority at the Board, a similar resolution would have been passed long ago, and would now, no doubt, be the law of the city. He showed the want of judgment on Councillor Davy's part, in bringing in an obnoxious and unworkable By-law, which would crush the tax-burdened citizen, and would not meet the requirements of the city, no matter how successfully it was worked. Councillor Murphy was not in favor of capitalizing the city's debt; but, he said, when a corporation gets into difficulties, it is compelled to resort to measures which, under favorable circumstances, it would not. He felt sure the Government would help the city out of the difficulty, as it was instrumental in thrusting upon the Corporation the debt which it had to fight mostly against. Councillors Morris and Horne spoke briefly in favor of the original By-law—the former gentleman believing that both the By-law and amendment were necessary. His worship was called from the Council Chamber at 9 o'clock. Shortly after that time the Chairman expressed his intention of taking a vote on the amendment, but he was requested to wait until the Mayor returned. At 9.30 His Worship had not arrived. The Chairman again attempted to take a vote, but Councillors Crabee and Koughan retired to the auditorium and refused to vote on the amendment until the Mayor returned. A messenger was dispatched for the Mayor. At half-past ten the messenger returned and stated that the Mayor could not come, owing to the sudden death of his wife. The motion of adjournment was then carried. The result of this adjournment, without reporting progress to the Mayor, is that the By-law falls to the ground, and will have to be introduced anew.

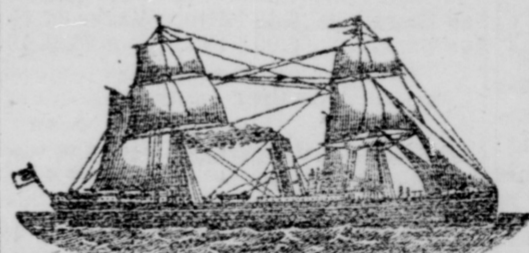
