TORONTO TORONTO (CP)—Mines and western oils Wednesday decline on the Toronto Stock Exchange. The oil's index touched a four-year low while base metals established an index low for the year. New Mylanaque featured speculative mines with an 18-cent dip to \$1.32 in active trading. A weakening in European and American copper prices resulted in a softer copper section. International Nickel was off 1/2 while Falconbridge dipped 1/2 to 25 1/2. Hudson's Bay was up 1/2 at 16 1/2 but few other western oils gained. Calgary and Edmonton and Home B dipped 1/2 while Royalite was off 25 cents at \$7.65. Golds were easier in quiet trading. McIntyre had the biggest loss, off 1/2 at 39 1/2. NEW YORK NEW YORK (AP)—The stock market mounted a brisk rally as steels, metals and electronics set the pace Wednesday. Electronics surged ahead amidst renewed speculative buying. Texas Instrument rose 6 1/2 and General Tire 7. Chemicals, aluminum, airlines and tobacco joined in the rise. Oils and aircraft remained ragged. The AP 80 - stock average advanced \$1.70 to \$225.60. Among the Canadian issues Aluminium Ltd., the second most active stock on the market, was up 1/2 at 36. Canadian Pacific and Hudson Bay Mining, both jumped 1/2. International Nickel and McIntyre Porcupine, both dropped by 1. On the American exchange Canadian issues were not active. What stocks did: Wed. Tues. MONTREAL MONTREAL (CP)—Prices were mixed and slightly lower in moderately active trading on the Montreal and Canadian stock exchanges Wednesday. There were several shifts of more than a point and some new lows were established. Metals were mixed. Aluminum was up 3/4 to 34 1/2 and Canadian British Aluminum up 1/2 to 15. Hudson Bay dropped 1/2 to 5 1/2. Steels were firm. National Steel Car rose 1/2 to 17 1/2 and Stelco was up 1/2 to 79. In generally lower oils, Texaco dropped one point to 78 and Interprovincial Pipelines lost 1/2 to 40 1/2. Imperial Oil rose 1/2 to 39. Papers were mixed, and two new lows established—International Paper at 106, down 4, and M and O at 31, down 3/4. Banks slipped, with Canadiane at 57 1/2 and Montreal at 59 1/2, each down 1/2. Utilities were generally lower. Quebec Natural Gas at 17 and Shawinigan A at 33 1/2 were each down 1/2. B.C. Phone rose 1/2 to 44. In foods Dominion established a new low at 69 1/2, down 1/4. Loblaw's B rose 1/4 to 38 1/2 and Ogilvie rose 1/2 to 49 1/2. Breweries were generally
