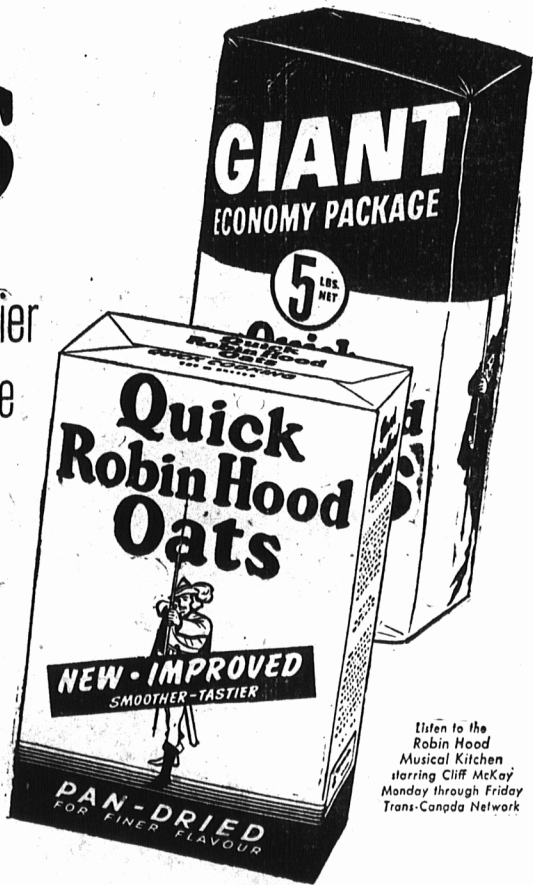

Convicted Vichy Politician Surrenders

PARIS, Nov. 4 — (Reuters) — George Hilaire, one of 13 Vichy politicians convicted after the 1944 liberation, surrendered today and was given "provisional liberty" while the law decides what to do with him.

Hilaire said he had been hiding out in Switzerland since a 1947 trial in his absence of charges of collaborating with the Germans. He was sentenced to five years' imprisonment.

Hilaire served as minister of the Interior in Pierre Laval's government from 1942 to 1944. He said illness prevented him from returning to France sooner.
