Rotarians Given Timely Study In National And International Politics

"Experts and Amateurs: a study in National and International Politics," was the subject of an illuminating address at the Charlottetown Rotary Club luncheon yesterday by Dr. Frank MacKinnon, principal of Prince of Wales College, who took for his text the recent dispute between President Truman and General Douglas MacArthur as illustrating once more that is one of the most complicated features of government administration—the relationship between the politician and the expert.

"There is much discussion in Congress, in the press, and on the radio about the various aspects of the present issue," said Dr. MacKinnon, "but underlying all the personal and military considerations is the obvious fact that the political-expert combination failed disastrously.

"Under the English system of constitutional government (which is practised in Canada) the affairs of state are administered by ministers of the Crown who are responsible to the people, and civil servants, more or less professional in their field, who are

responsible to the ministers. This combination is arranged so as to balance the strengths and weaknesses of both ministers and civil servants. The minister's responsibility and breadth of view makes up the civil servant's tendency to narrow specialization, bureaucracy, red tape and conservatism. On the other hand, the civil servant's technical knowledge and administrative experience offsets the minister's technical ignorance and tendency toward political expediency.

Characteristics "Briefly, the characteristics of a great minister of the Crown are: common sense, integrity, political responsibility, ability to seek and evaluate advice, and, above all, judgment. The faults of a poor minister are: laziness, too much concern for personal advancement, being a political hack, lack of judgment, ignorance combined with refusal to recognize his own limitations, stubbornness, inability to seek and evaluate advice or, worse, being too dependent

on the minister. This combination is arranged so as to balance the strengths and weaknesses of both ministers and civil servants. The minister's responsibility and breadth of view makes up the civil servant's tendency to narrow specialization, bureaucracy, red tape and conservatism. On the other hand, the civil servant's technical knowledge and administrative experience offsets the minister's technical ignorance and tendency toward political expediency.
