OTTAWA, July 21.—The House of Commons in supply in the discussion of ten thousand dollars to Bruce Mines wharf—a proposed work which some members declared to be altogether for the benefit of a private individual—Mr. Taylor moved that the item be struck out. The motion was lost by a vote of 43 to 22.

Mr. Bennett moved that the work be constructed by tender and contract. Hon. Mr. Fielding said that in Tarte's absence he did not feel justified in making promises.

Mr. Russell, (grit,) thought it a remarkable thing that the head of the greatest spending department in the Government should be away and that none of his colleagues should not be prepared to take the responsibility for public works. The motion was lost by a vote of 39 to 18.

SAVED FROM THE WRECK

Three Sailors Land at Canso.

HALIFAX, July 21.—Three more of the crew of the wrecked schooner *Battie E. Worcester* arrived at Canso in a dory yesterday. Their names are George Upton and Stanley Ryan of Gloucester and Joseph Rogers of New London, P. E. I.

They had been since Monday night in an open dory, but as they had plenty of food and water were none the worse for their experience.

MORE FIGHTING IN SAMOA.

Chiefs on both Sides Killed—Chambers Resigns.

APIA, July 11, via Auckland, N. Z., July 18.—There was fighting between the Mataatans and Malietans at Satafa on July 4, and three chiefs were killed. The British warship *Tauranga* and the German warship *Cormoran* sent landing parties ashore, who arrested the three chiefs who were responsible for the trouble. The prisoners were brought here for trial. The tripartite commissioners are holding meetings at Savaii and Upolu. They will return to Apia on July 12 and will then start for Washington.

Chief Justice Chambers will take a leave of absence on July 14. His return is regarded as improbable. The commissioners are considering whether a vacancy has been created in the chief-justiceship, as Mr. Chambers offered his resignation to President McKisley, who has not accepted it. Dr. Solf, the German representative, claims that he will become acting chief justice upon Mr. Chambers' departure. Though Mataatf recognizes the abolition of the kingship, some of his followers are raising funds to contest the question at law.
