S'side Will Not Have Mail Delivery Service

Summerside will not have a street delivery mail service, according to a notification received yesterday by Mr. Harold Rodd, Secretary of the Summerside Board of Trade from the Postmaster General G. Edouard Rinfret.
This service has for some time past been strongly advocated by the Summerside Board and as a result a survey was recently made of the town. At the conclusion of the survey it was felt that the findings were favorable and that street delivery in Summerside would be in operation by the time the new post office was officially opened.
However the communication from the Postmaster General advises that there must be a minimum of 2500 calls before the service can be inaugurated and according to figures submitted at the conclusion of the survey there are only 1531 calls in the town.
Regret was expressed in the letter to Mr. Rodd that in view of the result of the survey it was necessary to refuse the application at least for the present, and assurance was given that when the number of calls increased sufficiently that a favorable reply would be forthcoming.—S

French Airmen On Week-end Visit To Quebec City

QUEBEC, April 13 (CP) - Twenty five French Air Force navigational students from the Summerside, P.E.I., training base, arrived here today for a week-end visit, sponsored by the Quebec Kinsmen Club.
The group arrived by R.C.A.F. transport at nearby Ancienne Lorette Airport. The visit, which concludes Sunday, will include a tour of the city and a reception at the Royal 22nd Regiment's citadel mess.
The French fliers will end a seven-month air navigation course in May.

Yesterday morning at ten o'clock two Dakota aircraft took off from R. C. A. F. station Summerside with approximately 25 French airmen aboard who will spend two days as guests of the Quebec Kinsmen Club. The airmen are navigational students training here under the North Atlantic Treaty Organization and the trip was arranged through the Kinsmen Club of Summerside.
Two R. C. A. F. officers, Flight Lieutenant Jean-Paul Beaudet and L. G. Lacombe, are accompanying the group. The president of the Summerside club, Greg. Mulholland and club director George Olscamp were on hand yesterday morning to see the party off on their trip.
While in Quebec they will be lodged in homes of members of the Quebec Kinsmen Club and entertainment has been provided which will include a dance, a tour of the city, a reception at the Royal 22nd's Citadel mess and free time. They will return on Sunday.—S.

bank loans to business firms wishing to heavily augment stocks so as to take advantage of higher selling prices.
At present, except in a few isolated instances, the increases in prices forced by extra budget taxes have not been felt by the average citizen. Stocks on hand bought at the old price are being sold generally as before. Some instances have been reported of cigarettes being sold at the higher price.
Prior to the Budget there was heavy buying done in such items as cars and refrigerators. Washing machines showed some increase in sales, but electric and gas stoves, trucks and tires moved at an almost normal level.

Car Prices Affected
One of the smaller makes of cars now selling around the \$1,700 mark is expected to go over \$2,000 within a few weeks. It is feared here that the proposed "dumping duty", effective the end of May, plus the budget tax increase will add greatly to the cost of English made cars and put them into too high a bracket.
A tire dealer of this city told The Guardian that sales were good right now, but not abnormal. Fishermen are buying various items earlier this year than last, but he put it down to the fact that the spring season is a few weeks earlier than last year. An automobile dealer said he had anticipated a rush of buying, but it did not materialize. However, he noted that the buying was steadier than normal. Another dealer said he had experienced a considerable rush before the budget but that buying had levelled off since it was announced.
Refrigerators have definitely been in greater consumer demand because of the budget and one dealer termed the buying "heavy". Even commercial refrigeration has been affected with greater sales of big units being reported.

Ontario Taxi Driver Murdered

KILLALOE, Ont., April 13 (CP) - The strangled and battered body of a 51-year-old taxi driver was found in his home today and police launched a widespread search for his slayer.
The victim was identified as Lloyd Barber, of Killaloe, a community about 100 miles west of Ottawa.
Police said a hand towel was knotted about the throat and the man's head apparently had been battered by a blunt instrument.
The body was discovered by Thomas Ryan, owner of the house, after Barber was missed since early yesterday. He searched the lower floor of the house and then went upstairs to find the body in the bathroom.
