ONE OF THE STRAWS.

AFTER all the noise made by the discreet Guardian, Mr. John G. Scrimgeour continues to hold the advantage of his Customs warehouse and his offices under the Liberal Governments of Canada and this Province. Not only so. Mr. Scrimgeour was one of the speakers at the Liberal meeting held yesterday.

"HOW NOT TO DO IT"

A correspondent at Alberton writes: "The T. A. Stewart is here this evening. She lost the Dredge, Stanley and Henry Aitken en route, and is earning \$25 a day at our wharf. It seems very doubtful that the service the dredge may render at Malpeque will balance the cost of sending her there and bringing her back.
