

# Improved Ferry Service Sought By S'side Council

**SUMMERSIDE BUREAU OF THE GUARDIAN**  
 Urging continuous daily ferry transportation until 1 a.m., Councillor Leo Wood told the Summerside Town Council last night that the 9.30 p.m. crossing should be a thing of the past.

Noting reports of trouble experienced by the Scotia in weekend crossings he advocated that the council urge the government to proceed at once on the construction of a new ferry, and suggested that the government should take the operation from the Canadian National Railway and place it under the department of transport.

He said that the Lennox Island Indian reservation appeared to have better transportation than this province had to the mainland, because all its residents had to do to get across was to go down to the wharf and wave a handkerchief and a boat would come across to get them.

After the matter was discussed by various councillors who were unanimous in their agreement for the need of improved ferry service, Mayor W.A. Currie said he would discuss the matter with the Summerside Board of Trade to see if improvements can be obtained in the ferry service and schedules to the mainland.

**WHARF SCALES NEEDED**  
 In resolutions approved by the council, the department of transport was requested to install a set of suitable scales at the railway wharf for the weighing of fertilizer and other commodities before delivery.

The resolution noted that transportation over Summerside streets to Holman's public scales for weighing, resulted in spreading amounts of fertilizer over the streets.

The council accepted an offer of \$775 from the firm of Williams and Murphy for the purchase of 1.9 acres of land from the old airport property for industrial purposes.

Councillors also approved an expenditure of \$2,500 for the additional installation of 124 sprinkler heads in a fire sprinkler system being installed at Summerside Stadium.

This amount is additional to \$12,900 authorized in June for the installation of 600 sprinkler heads at the stadium.

**CONTRACT LET**  
 A contract was awarded to M.F. Schurman Company Ltd. who had the lowest per unit tender price for the laying of water and sewer mains in the town.

Correspondence at the meeting included a letter from the M.F. Schurman Co. requesting water and sewer extensions to service land they own on the MacSween Road.

Councillor Wood reporting as chairman of the finance committee, reported that 89.4 of the tax roll had been collected. He said \$47,600 was still outstanding but most of it is expected before the end of the year. He said bank restrictions due to "tight money" were now appearing on town level, and an effort was being made to keep up collections so as to keep down the town's bank overdraft.

Noting an almost monthly increase of about 14 per cent in electrical demand, Councillor W.E. MacCausland said the Summerside Electric Light Company had purchased 32 per cent of its power from Maritime Electric during the month. He said that information supplied by three companies submitting bids for the sale of a new engine for the electric light department, was now being studied, and some recommendation should be available within a week on which engine to purchase.

Councillor J. Ernest Morrison, chairman of the stadium committee, announced that from Jan. 1 to Sept. 30, revenue from the canteen amounted to \$1,843 while from regular stadium dances was \$2,523, putting the ring operation about \$600 over all operating expenses.

# Regional High Mooted In Hunter River Area

**HUNTER RIVER** — Rates payers of 30 school districts in and around this central Queens village are currently attempting to work out a plan for the construction of a regional high school on a co-operative basis.

Malcolm MacKenzie, provincial deputy minister of education said yesterday that the area's approach to the problem was unique in local educational circles. The department was in full accord with the objectives of the group, he added.

Mr. MacKenzie noted that the sponsors of the proposed school were not urging the immediate construction of a complete school. Present efforts called for the establishment of a center sufficiently large to accommodate only Grades 7, 8, 9, and 10. Addition of Grades 11 and 12 would come later.

Before the construction would be approved a special vote would be taken among the taxpayers concerned, the deputy minister noted.

Last week a meeting of the ratepayers representing the districts of New Glasgow, Mayfield Stanley Bridge, Cavendish and Rustico was held. Thursday night representatives of Hunter River, Brookfield, Rennie Road and Greenvale, will meet in Hunter River School.

E. Foster Hall of Hunter River, chairman of the steering committee said at the first meeting that only a five-room structure is contemplated at present with special facilities for lab work, home economics, commercial subjects and elementary mechanics.

Each meeting will feature a film on the building of regional high schools in Alberta. Generally the sessions will emphasize costs and school layout.

As well Miss Waite, who is a native of Grand River, assists in speeding up admission of in-patients by typing out the various forms necessary to admit a patient to the hospital.

# Prince Co. Hospital Offering New Physiotherapy Service

The new physiotherapy service which began at the Prince County Hospital in July has been of inestimable value to hundreds of patients since that time. The service is designed to rehabilitate muscles in various part of the body, but more especially in arms and legs.

In this way many of those who have suffered injuries to limbs are helped to regain the use of the injured members far sooner than they otherwise would have if left without physiotherapy treatment.

R.P. MacFarlane is the physiotherapist at the hospital in Summerside. He treats 14 to 16 patients per day by means of breathing and leg exercises, massage, short wave diathermy and infra-red heat lamp, restoring weak or wasted muscles to partial or full use.

Mr. MacFarlane is a native of Glasgow, Scotland and came to Canada in 1957 when he joined the staff of the Polio Clinic and Health Centre in Fredericton.
