### Russians Add New Chapter To Long List Of Cruelty In Hungary

Russia repeated history by throwing its soldiers into the struggle to suppress a Budapest revolt — and added one more bloody count to the reasons Hungarians as a whole hate Russia. These reasons go back more than a century. The intensely nationalistic Magyars, as the Hungarians call themselves, never forgot the record of Russian intervention and cruelty in Hungary.

### Norway Protests To U. S. Against Fish Tariff Hike

WASHINGTON (AP) — Norway protested to the United States Tuesday against a tariff commission recommendation for a 5-per cent increase in duties on imports of groundfish fillets.

Norwegian Ambassador Wilhelm Munthe de Mortenstjerne delivered a note to the state department appealing to President Eisenhower to overrule the tariff commission's finding.

Morgenstjerne told reporters afterwards he stressed "the great difficulties" any tariff increase would cause among Norwegian fishermen whose catch is exported to the American market.

Norway exports about \$800,000 worth of groundfish fillets annually to the United States. Denmark exports about \$1,000,000 worth.

Canada, which ships the biggest amount of fish fillets, lodged a protest similar to Norway's last week.

President Eisenhower has the right to reverse the tariff commission recommendation, forwarded to him Oct. 12. He has 60 days in which to act.

New England fishing interests contended before the tariff commission that increased imports has caused serious harm to the American fishing industry. The commission supported their view and recommended tariffs be increased 50 per cent from the rate set Jan. 1, 1939, under a trade agreement with Canada.
