The Commons passed a supply bill for \$450,944,478 to meet June government bills after opposition MPs called for action to halt the soaring cost of living.

Library Conference Underway At Centre

The 27th annual conference of the Atlantic Provinces Library Association was officially opened last night by the Lieutenant-Governor W.J. MacDonald at the Confederation Centre Library. Approximately 75 delegates are expected to register for the four-day convention.

All business sessions will be presided over by Douglas Boylan, librarian at Confederation Centre Library, president of the association.

A special session for school librarians will feature today's program. This phase of the convention will begin at noon, when John Wright, supervisor of school libraries for the Province of Saskatchewan, will deliver the keynote address on school libraries at a luncheon at Montgomerie Hall, which will be tendered by Prince of Wales College.

Some 30 school librarians, including a number from Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, will be on hand for today's part of the convention, thereby bringing the convention registration to more than 100 persons. A workshop on school libraries will be conducted this afternoon at Montgomery Hall.

Other highlights of the program include a banquet this evening at the Charlottetown Hotel, where the guest speaker will be Mrs. Christie Harris, well-known Canadian author who has been a resident of this province for the past year; a Sunday evening session at St. Dunstan's University, where Dr. E.P. Bolger will be guest speaker at a dinner tendered by St. Dunstan's; and a noon luncheon on Monday at Confederation Centre, with the City of Charlottetown as host.

Business sessions will be conducted this morning, Monday morning and Monday afternoon at Montgomery Hall and Confederation Centre. This afternoon during the session on school libraries, the university librarians will meet in a concurrent session.

The convention will conclude early Monday afternoon.

Alberton Woman Dies in Hospital

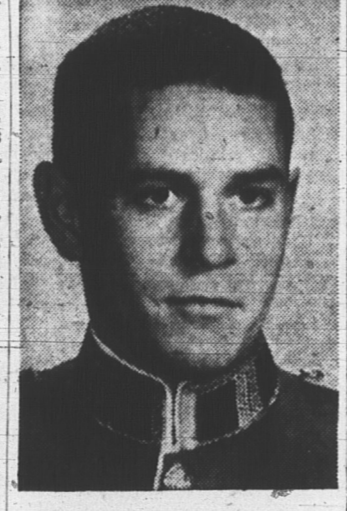
The death of Mrs. Frank McAlduff occurred suddenly at the Western Hospital early Friday morning.
