ECLIPSE OF THE SUN.—Astronomers are now busy with their preparations for observing the eclipse of the sun, which will occur on the morning of Monday, May 28th, and will be total along a track varying from forty to fifty miles in width, and extending from New Orleans to Norfolk. From there the shadow will cross the ocean, will traverse the Spanish Peninsula, leap over the Mediterranean to Algiers, and finally leave the earth not far from Thebes. Before reaching the United States it will have come across Mexico and the Gulf, its entire path being over seven thousand miles in length. It is now more than thirty years since a total eclipse of the sun visited the Atlantic coast of America, in 1869; nor will the thing occur again until 1925. At any given point, therefore, such events are extremely rare, and for this reason, if no other, are of great interest.

Situation at Pretoria.

LONDON, Feb. 28.—A despatch to the Times from Lorenzo Marques states that political prisoners who were released at Pretoria make unfavorable reports concerning the treatment of the prisoners there. Beyond bread and coffee they receive only a half-pound salt meat twice a week. They get no vegetables. Sickness is rife in the town and camps. There are 270 tents in the Gaol Hospital. The despatch proceeds:—
"On Tuesday Commandant Botha telegraphed from Colenso that the Boer army had been knocked out, and that it was impossible to maintain the defence much longer. He advised President Kruger to sue for peace.
"President Steyn wired President Kruger that the Free State Boers were refusing to continue to fight, and he, too, urged overtures for peace.
"Disaffection is reported among the Boers at Mafeking and Pretoria. The authorities at Pretoria are exercised over the leakage of important news from here. A commission has been appointed to investigate the matter."

ALF. ELLIS AND THE BOER

A Brief But Convincing Argument as to the Claims of the British.

Alf. Ellis, the commercial traveler, so well known in St. John and to all the boys on the road, is not a whit behind any one else in his loyalty to the British arms in the fight with the Boers. Not long ago, at North Sydney, he sat down at the hotel table to take a meal, not feeling very well physically and a little out of sorts at some adverse news which had come from the Transvaal. Opposite to him at the table was a stranger who was vigorously and aggressively pro-Boer. Commenting on the news from the seat of war, he proceeded to denounce the British as cowards and incompetents and otherwise to criticize the situation.

Now, when Alf. Ellis was in his best time, he used to be able to put 50 pounds with his right arm, and even out of training he is not a good man for an impertinent stranger to tackle.

He listened to the man across the table until he got tired, when he calmly lifted the large pitcher of cold water and threw it full in the stranger's face. The man did not like it, of course, but there was no more anti-British talk around the hotel while Mr. Ellis remained in North Sydney. —St. John Freeman.

The Boer Plan.

LONDON, Monday, Feb. 26.—The campaign is now approaching a most interesting phase. In about a fortnight the Congress of the Afrikander Bond will meet, and it is rumored that Mr. Hofmeyer will then propose peace terms, on the basis of the Republics retaining absolute independence, but offering to disarm. If these terms are rejected it is understood that a manifesto will be boldly issued to the Dutch throughout South Africa, calling upon them to throw off their allegiance to Great Britain. Probably the rumors are exaggerated, but there is no doubt that the greatest anxiety prevails in Cape Town regarding coming events. Germany, through the semi-official Berliner Post, reiterates that all reports of German intervention are quite without foundation.
