

**The Mendelssohn Quintette Club.**

Few, we think, will be found to dispute the fact that last night witnessed a "new departure" in the music-loving circles of Charlottetown. For the first time within the memory of man, we had the pleasure of listening to a performance, the music of which was both classical and artistic, and that our people are capable of appreciating.

The opening selection, a quintette in B flat (op 87) Mendelssohn, was a masterpiece of artistic skill, and no sooner had the first few notes been sounded than the audience were completely in the power of the performers, who held it spell-bound. Mr. Schade next appeared in a concerto for the flute, his skill upon which was simply marvellous. The audience fairly held their breath—hanging upon the last few notes, until the close, when the thunder of applause which burst forth was alike creditable to the skill of the artist and the discernment of the audience. In response to an encore, Mr. Schade came to the front and bowed. Upon making her first appearance, Miss Lewis was greeted with a round of applause, which was only a prelude to that which she received when her finished rendition of a scene and air from "Dor Freischutz" had been heard. Miss Lewis, in addition to a voice of great compass, flexibility, sweetness and power, is possessed of a grace of manner which adds materially to her effectiveness, and we trust that now the Rubicon (which divides us from the mainland) has been crossed, we may often have the pleasure of listening to her cultured voice. The first part of the programme concluded with a quartette entitled "the Miller's Pretty Daughter," in which the excellence of the Club in their concerted pieces was perfectly and fully brought out. In the first part, "the Declaration," two voices—those of a lover and a lady—could be most distinctly heard, as distinctly, indeed, as it is possible for other than human throats to utter them; while in part two, the clatter of "the Mill" could clearly be distinguished amid the crouching of the wheel and the gentle plashing of the water.

Part two of the programme opened with a "Fantasia for Violin and Gipsy Airs," which was superb, and in response to an encore which admitted of no refusal, Mr. Schmitzler reappeared and gratified the audience by a short repetition. A quartette from Hayden, and one from Cherubini came next, after which Mr. Giese entranced the audience by his rendition of "Le desir," as a solo upon the violoncello, which was emphatically the piece "par excellence" of the evening. Indeed it was difficult to believe that the soft notes and fine passages were not those of a violin, and the performance was a revelation of what a master's hand can do upon an instrument which is popularly supposed to be only a "buck fiddle." A song, "Oh, loving heart, trust on," was very sweetly rendered by Miss Lewis, every note and every word being clear and distinct; and when, in response to a rapturous encore, she sang "Twickenham Ferry," the enthusiasm of the audience knew no bounds, and all hearts were hers. When we consider that Miss Lewis had but just come off the steamer, during the passage of which she was attacked by that distressing "mal de mer," her splendid power and voice are a greater subject of wonderment, as it would have been a matter of little surprise had she altogether failed to appear. The performance closed with a Romanzo and Rondo, with Clarinetto Principale, which was a masterly effort, and stamped Mr. Ryan as a prince among players. During the evening the announcement was made, and we are pleased to be able to repeat it, that another opportunity will be afforded of hearing this distinguished Club, as they will again perform to-night, with a complete change of programme, and we advise all our readers to go, and to take their sisters, their cousins, and their aunts.

**Canada Temperance Act, 1878.**

There seems to be a good deal of difference of opinion as to the working of the Scott Act in Summerside. It is said that the law is openly violated in face of the officers of the law, but this is hardly credited here. The law is very clear and explicit. Section 55 of the Scott Act provides:—

"That it is the duty of any Officer, Constable or License Inspector, when any information is given to such officer, that there is cause to suspect that some person is violating the law, he shall make diligent enquiry into the truth of such information, and enter complaint before the proper court without communicating the name of the person giving the information."

The market to-day was largely attended and well supplied. Sales were brisk at the following prices: Beef, (small) from 6 to 14 cents; do. (qtr.) from 5 to 8 cents; Mutton, per lb., from 5 to 9 cents; Lamb, per lb., from 4 to 9 cents; Chickens, per pair, from 30 to 50 cents; Turkeys each 75 to 1.25; Geese 50 to 60 cents; Fowls, from 40 to 60 cents; Butter, fresh 18 to 22 cents; do. tub, 16 to 17 cents; Veal per lb., 3 to 8 cents; Ducks 40 to 50 cents; Eggs, from 14 to 15 cents; Flour (per 100 lbs.) \$3; Oatmeal, \$3. Hay per 100 lbs, from 30 to 40 cents; Oats per bushel 34 to 35 cents; Potatoes 25 cents; Sheepskins 45 to 55 cents.

MR. JAMES DOVER leaves to-morrow morning for Halifax with his trotting mare "Lady Bagnall," to trot a race with Messrs. Sullivan's horse "Donald," on the Polo grounds. This time the race will be for \$100 a side, mile heats, best three in five. "Lady Bagnall" will also take part in the Kentville and Moosepath races.

MOOSEPATH DRIVING PARK.—There will be some interesting racing at Moosepath Driving Park, St. John, during exhibition week, on Wednesday and Thursday, October 6th and 7th. On Wednesday there will be three races—one for 3 minute class, purse \$150; for 2.38 class, purse \$200; and a sweepstake for the ladies' cup for four year old colts and fillies. The second day's racing will embrace three races also, as follows: For 2.45 class, purse \$150; a purse of \$250, free for all trotters; and a purse of \$150, open to all runners. This programme should attract a goodly number of horsemen and spectators.—Sun.

**P. E. Islanders Again Successful.**

To the Editor of the Examiner.

STR.—Our Caledonia Gathering, yesterday, was a great success. Although it rained for a short time in the middle of the games, still it did not mar the amusements of the day. The entries from the Island were very good. From Charlottetown was Fred Bevan and his father, and Malcolm Nicholson and Donald Nicholson, from Strathalbyn. In the 100-yards foot race there were nine competitors, in which Charlottetown did well. Fred Bevan took first money and his father—Job, had a scorable for second place with Dawson, of Picton, champion runner. Job fouled at the side ropes and both fell simultaneously; so they were swiftly passed by others before they regained their feet. In the 4-mile race Fred Bevan made a good second place, and in the mile race he also made second place against Finlay, the great mile champion runner of the Province of Nova Scotia. Finlay belongs to Gleason, Scotland, and his record for a mile race is very nearly the fastest on record—4m. 33s.; but had not Bevan's shoes been unsuitable—owing to the footing being very slippery and troublesome to fast runners—he would have beaten his opponent. Samuel Nicholson, of Strathalbyn, took first money in the high vaulting jump, and also first money in the high running jump; and Malcolm Nicholson, of Strathalbyn, took second prize in the standing high jump—4 feet 4 inches; he also took second prize in the hurdle race, which was a tightly contested race. There was only two entries in the mile and half walking match, viz: J. Bevan, of Charlottetown, and J. Carvenou, of New Glasgow. Therefore, the match did not take place; but in the eyes of the Charlottetownians living in Picton their betting on Bevan was as the favorite. From what Fred Bevan done here yesterday in the 100 yards, quarter mile, and mile races, and had it been done by him on good footing instead of wet, slippery grass, and as I also learn, was very sick on the trip over, owing to the heavy sea running, he would have made great time in all the matches; and if Master Fred B. only takes good care of himself, I promise for him in the future (with a little training, for he has already the muscle and bone) to be one of the best long runners that we have in the Province.

**Summerside Items.**

The Pioneer made its first appearance on Tuesday evening last. It is looked upon very favorably by our citizens, and we suppose Mr. McKinnon, has given his "wandering o'er." We wish the Pioneer success.

An election for the Town Council will take place about the first week in October. The running of a ticket composed of temperance men who will help to enforce the Canada Temperance Act is being advocated.

On Sunday last the Bulgarian monk who has been tramping through the Island, arrived at Summerside after walking from Kensington a distance of nine miles. He pitched his tent at the eastern part of the town and was soon surrounded by a throng of the curious. He took passage on Monday morning's boat for Point du Chene.

On Monday morning last, Mr. Murdoch McLeod, shipped on board the schooner Favorite, Capt. Matheson, 11 head of cattle and between 50 and 60 sheep, for Miramichi. This is the second shipment made by this gentleman during the past month. The cattle were far superior to that of the previous shipment.

A drunken rough who took passage on the steamer Jennie B for Bedeque on Monday evening behaved himself in such a disorderly manner, as to cause one of the passengers to compel him to behave. The rough who was full of bad liquor and fight, was landed on the Island Park wharf where he had everything to himself and where he was compelled to stay until he became sober.

The foundation of the new lighthouse has been securely placed and the woodwork is being rapidly pushed forward by the Contractor.

The case of Daniel Noonan for violating the Canada Temperance Act, is dragging its weary way before the Stipendiary Magistrate. It was before the Court on Tuesday and Thursday, and has been again put off until Friday, when it is to be hoped a decision will be reached.

The Dublin Evening Telegraph of the 26th of August says:—"Twenty-seven paper girls, accompanied by a matron, left the South Dublin workhouse to-day for Canada. Previous to their departure they were brought into their boardroom, and the Chairman conveyed to them the good wishes of the Board as to their future success in life. He pointed out that perhaps if they had been residing with their parents at home they would not have had this opportunity of making such a start in life. The Board had, with the sanction of the Local Government Board, decided to give each of them the sum of 5s when they had arrived on board ship. The young emigrants, who looked healthy and neatly attired, thanked the Board and retired, and were subsequently accompanied to Westland-row railway terminus by the master and his assistant."
