Coach Jack Kane greeted lettermen back from the S.D.U. Saints as The University of Prince Edward Island opened practice last week. Last year's edition of S.D.U. finished first in the Maritime Intercollegiate Athletic Association, only to be beaten by scrappy St. Thomas University team in the playoffs.

A good group of rookies join the veterans, but they must fill positions vacated by excellent players. All-star Rick O'Donnell and goalie Carl McQuaid graduated. Hard hitting Dennis Affleck, Ralph McCully, and Joe Brown are gone. These were all big name players in the league, the question is can they be

adequately replaced.

Netminder Mike Brown will be back and is expected to be one of the top goalies in the league. Brown and McQuaid combined last season for the lowest goals against average in the circuit. Dependable Bill Carson, Ken Ballem, and Wayne MacDou-

gall return to the defensive corps. Two-thirds of the DOT line returns with Bob Doherty and Barry Turner. High scoring Allan Flood and Cecil MacDonald, John Irwin, and bonecrunching Billy Adams will be the nucleus of a team that will have plenty of offensive punch, but due to the loss of Affleck, be slightly

weaker on defence.

Newcomers to the squad are Dave Garad, Dan McCurdy, Brian MacVicar and Gary McIsaac; defencemen: Alvin Hackett, John McCarron, Jack McEachern, Paul Murray, Tim Hansen, and Gus Houston, forwards; and Paul Jelley, goalie.

PANTHERS MAULED BY 'X'

U. of P.E.I. was battered by St. Francis Xavier Uni-

versity by a score of 53-6. The passing of Terry Dolan,

running of Walter Strapps and Burns MacPherson completely overwhelmed the Panthers and the "X" defense buried Foley and company.

The lone U.P.E.I. tally began on the Panther thirty-three yard line. On a third down and ten yards to go situation, Foley ran to the U.P.E.I. fifty yard line. This was followed by another Foley run to the "X" thirty-

two. After a pass to Rod Scharf was batted down by the X-Men secondary, Foley connected with Lajeunesse to the twenty-two yard line and a first down. A reverse to Don Murray got a yard. Foley was broke loose, by an excellent block by Jim Paolini, and he broke tackles to the eight. Two running plays netted minus yardage, then Foley connected to Peter

Sprague for the major. The two point conversion was incomplete.
