"PRIZE LIST" of Provincial Exhibition on last page.

THERE will be a meeting of the City Council this evening at 7.30.

One hundred and twenty-seven horses were shipped to the United States last week.

The Toronto Globe says the Summerside Journal "speaks for Conservatives." If it does, it speaks through a Grit "Inspector of Weights and Measures."

We learn that a blunder—which would have invalidated the election—was made in the papers issued for the purpose of electing a representative of Cardigan; but that it was corrected in time by the High Sheriff of King's County—Michael McCormack, Esq.

CRICKET.—The match of "Married" vs. "Single," which was to have been played to-morrow, has been unavoidably postponed. There will however be a match of some description, and all the members of the club are requested to put in an appearance at 2.30 p.m.

In view of the increasing number of young ladies and gents who on market days parade around the butchers stands in the Market House, we would suggest that the Market Clerk be empowered to issue promenade tickets.—Com.

We were shown in the market to-day some very large stocks and leaves of rhubarb, which were grown by Mr. James Lewis, of St. Clair. The stock of one which we measured was two feet long, and the leaf was 2 feet 6 inches long by 2 feet wide. This rhubarb is superior to any which we have seen imported this season.

At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court, this forenoon, George Swan, for stealing thirty dollars from his mother, was committed for trial at the June term of the Supreme Court; Samuel McDougall and William Murray, two juveniles, summoned on complaint of Miss Ada McKinnon, for assault, did not appear, and a warrant was issued for their arrest.

THERE was a large attendance at the market to-day. The prices were as follows: Beef, small, from 8 to 15 cents; do., by the quarter, from 7 to 10 cents; mutton, per lb., from 7 to 12 cents; lamb, per quarter, from 50 cents to \$1.00; butter, fresh, per lb., from 16 to 21 cents; eggs, per doz., from 8 to 10 cents; barley, per bush., from 60 to 75 cents; oats, per bush., from 43 to 45 cents; hay, per 100 lbs., 60 to 65 cents.

DROWNING ACCIDENT.—A St. Andrew's, N. B., despatch to the St. John Globe states that Captain Brad Rideout, of Calais, and Horace Pettigrove, of Bayside, were drowned at the wharf in Calais, on Tuesday afternoon, by the upsetting of their boat, which was caused by Captain Rideout stepping quickly into it from the wharf. The bodies were found soon after. Benjamin Pettigrove, father of Horace, and two other men narrowly escaped drowning. They were in the boat when it capsized.

THE steamer "Albert" is performing regular fortnightly trips between Picton, Magdalen Islands, Georgetown and Souris. Surely, King's County, Prince Edward Island, must ever feel indebted to the Dominion Government, and especially to the Hon. D. Davies, chairman of the Steam Navigation Company for the generous attention given to this constituency. If this is a specimen of the Trade policy of the General Government, it should be encouraged and perpetuated—just as short a time as possible. Protection may not be acceptable, but we can confidently assure the powers that be, that this Free-of-Trade policy is far more unsatisfactory than they have ever dreamed of. Yet, we expect soon to hear that Mr. Davies is a popular Free Trader.—K. C. Advertiser.

ON Wednesday evening last a man named George Swan was arrested by Officer McGregor, for stealing a purse containing \$30 from his mother. He appeared before the Magistrate this morning for examination. The evidence taken shows that at noon on Wednesday he entered his mother's dwelling house and stole the purse from her bed room. She missed the purse shortly after it was taken, immediately suspected the prisoner of taking it, and left orders at the Police Station for his arrest. He was about "striking out" to have a jolly time. When arrested by the officers in a bar room he was tendering a ten dollar bill for a treat. They immediately searched him and found on his person twenty dollars. The bartender returned to the police the change of the ten dollar bill which was tendered for the drink, and thus Mr. S. only succeeded in squandering twenty cents of the stolen money. He was committed for trial at the June sitting of the Supreme Court for larceny.

IN the upper apartment of the Market House this forenoon, a market woman caused a general commotion. It was soon after she entered the apartment and laid her saleables on the table that she thrust her hand into her pocket, and found that her purse, containing a large sum of money was gone. Her disappointment could not be expressed. She became excited, and as she searched every pocket in her market costume, she cast sharp and suspicious glances at all near by her. It was gone. No doubt her pockets were picked. In a terrible flutter of excitement, she told the police what had happened; got two to search the Market House, and asked the Marshal if she could have more—"at least a half a dozen." The two officers made a lively search. While they were thus engaged, a bright thought aroused the drooping spirits of the poor woman: to search her market basket. So doing, she found it in a corner where she concealed it before leaving her home. As she plucked it from her basket, six police entered the department in order to more closely prosecute the search.

NEWS BY TELEGRAPH.

(Special Despatch to Examiner.)

LONDON, June 6. A Bucharest despatch to the Times says the execution of the Topola rioters was a cold-blooded murder, intended to terrorize the Servian people; but it was unsuccessful in producing that effect.

The rioters were not revolutionists; they only made some noisy public demonstrations against the Cabinet policy and going to war with summoning the Skupstina.

A St. Petersburg despatch to the Times says: "The active work of the Congress will fall upon Count Schowaloff, even if Prince Gortschakoff goes to Berlin." The latter is incapable of prolonged mental action.

The Times' Pera correspondent telegraphs that Safvet Pasha's appointment as Grand Vizer is generally and justly welcomed. He will do nothing hastily, but what he does will be judicious.

A despatch from Vienna to the Daily Telegraph says: "The time was when such a meeting as the coming Congress would have been preceded by private communion of Prince Gortschakoff and Count Andrassy with Prince Bismarck."

Count Andrassy does not leave Vienna until the 11th inst., and an order has been issued to mobilize 100,000 Austrian troops instead of 50,000.

All these, says the correspondent, "offer a guarantee that the ghost of the triple alliance will not trouble the deliberation of Congress."
