PUBLIC MEETING in Market Hall this evening.

FROM MONTREAL.—The steamer Miramichi is expected here this afternoon about four o'clock.

THE MATILDA DAMAGED.—An exchange reports that the bark Matilda, Capt. Rice, from Charlottetown for Port Spain, has put into St. Thomas with loss of foremast and mainmast.

THE RIFLE.—Riflemen will please take notice that the prize meeting of the Provincial Rifle Association of P. E. Island will be held on Kensington Range on Wednesday and Thursday, the 9th and 10th of August, instead of the 2nd and 3rd, as at first intended.

POLICE COURT.—This forenoon, the summons against one of two men charged with being drunk and fighting on Lower Queen Street on the 19th inst., was dismissed.

To-day a summons was served on Philip Carley for selling intoxicants to Isaac Peters, an Indian, on the 26th inst. The summons is returnable to-morrow.

CRICKET.—A match—Rights against Lefts—will be played at Victoria Park to-morrow afternoon, commencing at sharp half-past two o'clock. The names of the players will appear in the Guardian to-morrow morning. The match bids fair to be one of the most interesting of the season. Many years have elapsed since it was possible to obtain teams of "rights" and "lefts" in Charlottetown.

DON'T FORGET IT.—A public meeting will be held in the Market Hall this evening, at which addresses on the public questions of the day will be delivered by Hon. Geo. E. Foster, Minister of Finance, and Hon. A. R. Angers, Minister of Agriculture. A limited number of seats will be reserved for ladies, and arrangements will be made whereby they may enter by the eastern door of the building—the door next to the post office.

CANADA'S CHINESE POPULATION.—Recent returns show that the total number of Chinese who entered Canada for the year ending June 30th, was 2,258, as against 3,282 the same period of the previous year. The total number who left Canada on leave was 1,171, against 2,165 the year previous. The per capita tax of \$50 on each new arrival and charge for the issue of return certificates gave \$113,491, of which, under the statute, British Columbia will receive about \$27,000. The revenue accrued last year was \$165,952.

MUSIC IN THE GARDENS.—The promenade concert in Queen Square Gardens last evening was attended by a great many people, and the music discoursed by the Artillery Band, under the leadership of Mr. John Wood, was greatly appreciated. It seems too bad that there is not enterprise enough in the city to have these public concerts once or twice a week during the summer season. The cost would not be very great, and if taken out of the treasury in the shape of an annual grant to each of the two city bands, it would be borne equally by all citizens.

SHOOTING.—The first shooting competition of No. 3 Company, 82nd Batt., for the Company medal, open to non-commissioned officers and privates only, took place yesterday afternoon at Kensington Range. The day was very unfavorable, being showery, with strong, variable winds. The ranges were 200 and 400 yds., seven shots at each range. Private Wallace Smith leads with 53 points. CYCLONE AT HAZEL GROVE.

MUCH DAMAGE INFLICTED WITHIN THE TERRITORY COVERED.

Mr. Philip Bagnall's Farm Visited—Trees and Fences Broken Down and Coils of Hay Carried a Great Distance—Barracks Blown to Pieces and Holes Frenched in the Roof of a Dwelling House—Mr. Bagnall and his Family have a Narrow Escape.

YESTERDAY, about half-past three o'clock in the afternoon, Hazel Grove was visited by a regular cyclone, which, if not very great considering the territory covered, was equal to the very worst for the damage inflicted within its scope.

The principal injury was sustained on the farm of Mr. Philip Bagnall, who reports that the cyclone, for a distance of about half a mile from his house, made a path through trees, which were snapped off like pipe stems, through haystacks, where it carried the coils of hay to a great distance; through the fences, which were levelled for three chains. The storm struck two barracks, knocking them to pieces and blowing some of the logs through the roof of the barn. The top of one barrack was taken and blown on top of the house, punching two holes in the roof and tearing off the flues and saddle-board.

Mr. Bagnall and his family were in the garden and rushed for the house when the storm struck, and succeeded in getting in, though not without narrowly escaping injury.

Some of the boards from the barracks were carried twenty chains, and it is reported that a barrack and the fences on adjacent farms in the path of the cyclone were blown down.

The appearance of the storm was something fearful as it tore its way through the fields, and those who saw it report it to be the worst that has ever visited that section of the country.
