

# Slim Lead Taken By U.S. In Davis Cup Competition

TORONTO (CP) — Big Barry McKay of Dayton, Ohio, Thursday gave the United States a 1-0 lead in their Davis Cup match against Canada as rain washed out the second singles match of the opening day's program.

McKay, the key man in the United States' Davis Cup hopes, overpowered Don Fontana of Toronto 6-1, 6-2, 7-5 and after three hours of an hour delay the second singles was postponed until today. The doubles, originally scheduled today, was put back to Saturday and the two concluding singles, which were to be held Saturday, now will be played Monday.

The doubles pairings have not been disclosed by either team captain, Perry Jones of the U.S. and Horne Main of Canada. However, it is expected that the American doubles' combination will be McKay and Sam Giammalva of Houston, Texas, who have paired often as a doubles team. They were the third-leading doubles team in U.S. in 1956-57.

In the singles match Thursday rain first threatened as McKay won the second set with service breaks in the third and fifth games. He broke Fontana in the fifth game with passing shots after the Canadian held a 30-0 lead. That game gave the U.S. player a 4-1 margin and each man held service for the next three games. Fontana took one of them with a love victory and McKay captured the other two, giving up two points in the sixth game and

their second place position when they play host to Barry's Lions. Lions trail the Aces by two points.

Other Canadians on the ailing list are heavyweight boxer Stan Renaud of Windsor, Ont., who suffered a badly bruised jaw in a sparring session, and wrestlers Kurt Boese, Kitchener, Ont., and Fred Flannery, Vancouver, both taking penicillin injections for mat burns.

# To Join Club As Assistant Coach

TORONTO (CP) — Stout Steve Owen, a master of defensive football who became one of the great coaches of the U.S. pro game during 24 years with New York Giants, will join Toronto Argonauts of the Canadian Big Four on a one-year contract as assistant to chief coach Hampton Pool.

Owen, 60, who during his National Football League career won note for the ability of his clubs to keep the opponents from scoring, will be given the job of beefing up the Argo defence and developing young players. He starts July 15.

Out of pro football since 1953 when he retired because of ill health and was succeeded by Jim Lee Howell in New York, Owen will assist another former NFL coach, Pool, who built his reputation by emphasizing offence during his term with Los Angeles Rams.
