

United States Visitors Enjoy Tour Of Provinces

We are visiting your lovely Province and when we leave, we will have visited and camped in every Province and in the Yukon Territory. We have also camped in 49 of our own States. We travel with a car and small camping trailer. We have been travelling every summer for the past 35 years and have met some very nice people in that time. For the past few years I have been doing a weekly series on our trips and send back an account of what we see and hear each week to the Medford Daily Mercury, Medford, Mass.

On this trip we have visited New Brunswick, Nova Scotia, Cape Breton, and Newfoundland. We took our car and trailer over on the Ferry from North Sydney, N.S. to Port Aux Basques and from Port Aux Basques we went over a heavily gravelled road, some hot top but mostly dirt and gravel and dust to St. John's. We made stops all along the way to see anything of interest.

We met and talked to several people before coming here and agreed that this was one Province we would love. They said, "you will find good roads in Prince Edward Island and you'll love the people. Be sure and try their potatoes, milk and butter you will find some fine camping spots on the island. Well, it didn't take us long to find a camping spot after we got off the boat so we had a wonderful sleep our first night in Prince Edward Island.

We visited Charlottetown the next day and spent some time in the Provincial Building which we found very interesting, then we rode around the city sightseeing. Later we went out to Strathgartney Park. We not only enjoyed this Park to the fullest, taking in all its beauty, we also did a wash while we were there and got it dry and ironed.

While I was ironing a lady came by and said she was curious to know how I was heating my iron. I believe she was quite surprised to see me put my electric iron on a gasoline stove too hot. She wanted to know if it damaged the iron to do this. I told her it hadn't hurt this one any. We plug it into the electricity when we have it and when we haven't we heat it on camp stoves.

What we have seen of your Province so far we love so I'm sure we will be delighted with the rest of it. Last year we made a 14,000 mile trip which took in Alaska

over the Alcan Highway and it was a very rough trip. However, we think the highway from Port Aux Basques to St. John's, Newfoundland is the roughest and dustiest we have ever been over in our 35 years of travel.

We were so happy to see your hot top roads, magnificent scenery and to meet some of your very nice people. We will spend a few days travelling from the Wood Island Ferry where we landed to Charlottetown, then to the beaches in the National Park. From the Park we then visit Summerside. Then we take the ferry at Borden, Prince Edward Island to Cape Tormentine, New Brunswick.

Before I end this, I would like to say that Mr. Eddy and I would like you to know that we think Strathgartney Provincial Park is one of the finest of its kind for picnicing and camping that we have ever been in and I think you will agree we have been in plenty during our 35 years of travelling all over Canada and United States.
