Local and Other Items.

SCOTT ACT.—One Scott Act summons has been served.

BETTER THAN EVER.—It is stated that the freight and passenger traffic over the Intercolonial Railway this season is considerably in excess of former years.

TROPHIES.—Two handsome cups, to be competed for at the coming regatta, have been imported, and will be exhibited this week in one of the jewelry stores.

FROM NEW GLASGOW.—There will be an excursion from New Glasgow to Charlottetown in the steamer St. Lawrence to-morrow. The steamer will arrive here about noon.

POLITICAL.—John L. Sullivan has determined to enter the ring again, and his New York admirers are prepared to back him to the extent of \$20,000 against Charley Mitchell or Kilrain.

PILGRIMS.—The number of pilgrims that visited the shrine of St. Anne de Beauspre, Quebec, this year is considerably in excess of the number in former years. Thursday last there were over 2,000.

TO-MORROW.—The Tea Party at Alberton to-morrow promises to be one of the best of the season, and will, no doubt, be largely attended. The special train leaves Charlottetown at 5 o'clock, standard.

MACKEREL.—Several very good catches of mackerel are reported from Tracadie. On Saturday there were quite a number of boats out, each one averaging between 500 and 800. The boats were out again this morning and made good catches. The fish are of excellent quality.

REGATTA.—A meeting will be held in the office of H. V. Palmer, next door to Bank of Nova Scotia, to-morrow evening, at half-past seven, to appoint committees to make arrangements for the regatta proposed to be held next month. A large attendance of all interested is particularly requested.

SMALL RAINFALL.—The report of the meteorological department of the weather in Toronto for the last month, states that the rainfall was the smallest with the exception of 1868 and 1887, and mean temperature was 1 degree 1/49 degrees lower than the average of 48 years.

REPAIRS.—Repairs on Souris breakwater are progressing. A block 30 feet square to prevent stone from being carried away, is being built at the outer end. This with additional ballasting, pile driving, and placing of large stone along the seaside of the work, constitute the principal repairs to be done.

THE RACE.—The race to come off between Black Pilot and Hernando is already freely talked about in town and country. We venture to say that there never was a trot on P. E. Island that brought more people together to witness it than will the one soon to take place at Summerside.

ROBBERY.—The Moncton Times reports that a young Frenchman was robbed of \$95 and a watch by another Frenchman named Leveque on the train between Newcastle and Bathurst on Thursday. The two had been talking and drinking gin during the ride, and it was after the victim had fallen asleep the robbery was committed. Leveque was captured shortly after getting off the train.

THE TURF.—On Friday last Mr. Robert Bonner drove Maud S. to a top road wagon, and turned the Fleetwood track in 2:19. He started at the half mile post, and the mare trotted the last half in 1:05. Under the conditions it must be considered a very extraordinary feat.

There will be a match race at Truro for \$50 a side, on Wednesday next, between J. Malcolm's brown mare Gypsy, and H. J. Kennedy's black mare Nellie T.

PAROCHIAL RESIDENCE.—The parishoners of St. Columba, East Point, are erecting a new parochial residence of large and artistic proportions. The building is two-and-a-half stories high, with bay windows in front and end. When completed it will be one of the finest buildings in the country. It is intended to be heated by hot water. Such a stately mansion, when finished, will reflect credit upon the parish, and prove a source of comfort to its hospitable and worthy occupants, the Rev. D. J. Gillis.

SWALLOWED HIS TEETH.—A Philadelphia man swallowed his teeth while eating fruit at a street stand. It took a button-hook, a policeman and a file of men, with power to win any tug of war in the country, to dislodge the distressing impediment from the man's throat. The policeman did the best preliminary work with his vigorous thumping of the victim's back, though the crowd grew loud and indignant over what seemed an outrage. They did not know the gentleman had bitten off more than he could swallow.

THE LADDER BROKE.—Mr. Peter H. Trainor, painter, met with an accident on Saturday evening that will likely confine him to his residence for some time. He was engaged painting the house occupied by Mr. A. J. Murphy, on Queen Street, and when at work on the third story, a few feet from the roof, the ladder upon which he was standing broke, and he fell to the ground. A young lad who was on the ladder with him at the time, clung to the rope that held the ladder in place until rescued by Chief Engineer Large. Mr. Trainor was stunned by the fall, and for a time it was thought that his injuries were fatal, but an examination by three medical men who were early on the scene demonstrated that beyond some bruises about the head and hip, and a general shake-up, there were no serious injuries. To-day he is reported "much better," and is able to sit up.

FOUND DEAD ON THE ROAD.—On Saturday evening last, as John Montgomery, of Naufrage, was returning from Souris, he saw a dead man lying on the road near Rollo Bay cross roads. He recognized the body as that of Fidele Deagle, an aged resident of the neighborhood. He at once notified the relatives, who took charge of it. It appears that the deceased had gone with a horse and cart to a spring for water, and after filling the barrels was on his way home when he fell off the cart and died. He was subject to heart disease, and there is no doubt but this was the cause of death. He was a very quiet, respectable and good living man, and was about 80 years of age. Under the circumstances an inquest was considered unnecessary. A Coroner's certificate to that effect having been obtained, the remains were interred in the Roman Catholic cemetery at Rollo Bay.

Local and Other Items.

TELEPHONIC.—Men are at work in the eastern part of the Island sinking holes preparatory to erecting a line as far east as Souris, and touching at various trade centres along the south side.

BETTING ON THE ELECTION.—The betting on the Presidential election has been rather lax in New York during the past few days. Some bets have, however, been made with odds of \$1,000 to \$800 on Cleveland.

POLICE COURT.—Patrick Corish, drunk, \$1 or 4 days; William Kuribek, drunk and disorderly, \$30 or 30 days; Andrew Brown, vagrancy, 3 months, hard labor; Neil Laughan, allowing a nuisance to remain on his premises, \$2.

EXCURSION.—Between one and two hundred excursionists arrived from Pugwash in the steamer Heather Belle to-day, and are now "doing" the town. The Band of the 82nd Battalion accompanied them over. They will return this evening.

BONE BROKEN.—H. H. Harvey, while practicing on the athletic club grounds, St. John, on Wednesday afternoon, had one of the small bones in his arm broken by being struck by a ball. Mr. Harvey's Charlottetown friends will regret to hear of the accident.

PEUCLAR.—They have a peculiar way in reporting hanging scenes out in Montana. A paper from there contains the information that "Five-ace Dave took leave of Devil's Gulch yesterday amid great enthusiasm, encircled by a crowd of old acquaintances and a neat hempen collar."

CHURCH AND ARMY.—Under its Quebec heading, this week's Church Guardian, of Montreal, says: "A young clergyman from Montreal Diocese, who has lately been taking duty in a Quebec church, was quite a prominent figure at the Salvation Army Jubilee last week. His Diocesan should call on him for explanations."

HANGED.—Walter H. Lennox, the murderer of Arthur Preller, was hanged at St. Louis, Mo., on Friday last. Early on the morning of the execution, Maxwell issued a long address to the people of England, in which he severely comments upon the American idea of justice, and charges that the government even resorted to crime itself to secure his conviction.

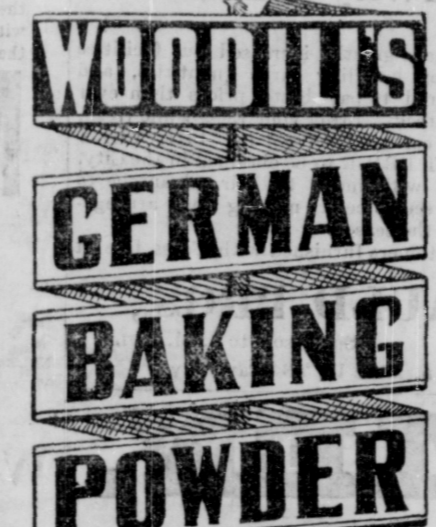
