Says Prisoners In Don Jail On Short Rations

TORONTO, Sept. 15.—(CP)—Some prisoners at the Don Jail were put on short rations for a time last week to head off a planned riot.

This was made known today by Col. Hedley Basher, deputy minister of reform institutes and temporary governor of the jail.

He said unrest developed at the jail after the escape of Edwin Boyd and three members of his gang last week.

"We merely showed the prisoners that they did what we wanted them to do, not what they wanted to do," said Col. Basher. "We had reason to believe there was a demonstration planned for Thursday in the dining room, so to avoid this we fed the prisoners in the corridors of tables covered with tablecloths."
