PHILATELIC MAIL The Postmaster General announces that he has authorized the carrying of philatelic air mail by the first international flight of a Canadian jetliner. The flight will depart from Toronto, on the 18th April, and terminate at Idlewild Airport, New York. Cachets will be applied to covers carried on this first official flight.

CITY POLICE COURT. At the Stipendiary Magistrate's Court yesterday, two men charged with being drunk and disorderly were both sentenced to 20 days in jail while a man and woman charged with being drunk and inebriated were dealt with, the man fined \$20 and costs or 30 days and the woman remanded until Monday. A man charged with breach of the traffic law was fined \$2 and costs or five days in jail. The remanded case of a man charged with assault causing bodily harm was further remanded until Monday. A man charged with disorderly conduct was remanded until today.

COUNTY COURT - Two judgments were delivered yesterday in the County Court of Queens County by Judge C. St. Clair Trainor. In Clyde David Bell vs Cyril MacMillan, a claim for damages for breach of warranty in an exchange of horses the Court found that the horse was not suitable for general work and that the difficulty in managing it was actually due to mistreatment by the plaintiff Bell after the swap. Counsel for the plaintiff was Mr. Donald McKinnon, K. C. for the defendant Mr. G. R. Foster. In the case of Walter R. Walkin vs Geo. Tull, Sr. and Geo. Tull, Jr. which arose out of an accident in Charlottetown May 22nd last in which a car driven by Tull, Jr. struck Walkin's car. The plaintiff alleged, but did not prove, that the Tull car was registered in the name of Geo. Tull, Sr. and the action against him failed. Judgment was entered against Geo. Tull, Jr. for \$24.00 and costs. Counsel for the plaintiff was Mr. C. R. MacQuaid, for the defendant, Mr. J. A. MacDonald, K. C. On motion of Mr. Lester O'Donnell assessments of damage was confirmed without contest in the case of Ronald MacDonald vs Edson Ostway. Five other cases were adjourned and the Court adjourned until 2:30 p. m. Friday.

Terms Bond Issue "Highly Successful"

OTTAWA, March 28 - (CP) - Approximately 1,000,000 buyers have purchased \$304,000,000 worth of the fourth series of Canada Savings Bonds introduced last fall. Finance Minister Abbott said tonight in the fiscal portion of his budget speech presented in the Commons. Terming the campaign "highly successful," he extended a tribute to the "splendid" work done by voluntary and professional workers in promoting the sale of the bonds.

Abbott Reveals Budgetary Surplus Of \$111,000,000

By D'Arcy O'Donnell Canadian Press Staff Writer OTTAWA, March 28 - (CP) - A 1949-50 budgetary surplus of \$111,000,000—the fourth consecutive surplus since the end of the war—was reported tonight by Finance Minister Abbott in his budget speech to the Commons.

The surplus for the fiscal year ending Friday compared with \$95,000,000 in 1948-49; \$670,000,000 in 1947-48 and \$373,000,000 in 1946-47 when a string of deficits extending back to 1939 was broken. Although 1949-50 accounts have not been closed, Mr. Abbott said it appears that revenues will total \$2,545,000,000 and expenditures \$2,435,000,000. In his budget speech at the fall session following the general election last June, Mr. Abbott had estimated that he would end the current year with a surplus of about \$90,000,000. At that time he estimated revenues would total approximately \$2,545,000,000 and expenditures \$2,460,000,000.

In 1948-49, revenues were \$2,771,400,000 and expenditures \$2,175,900,000. In 1946-50, the net debt, reduced by the amount of the surplus, dropped from \$1,176,100,000 to \$1,165,000,000. Mr. Abbott's figures were contained in the fiscal portion of his speech, which preceded the section containing proposed tax changes for the coming year.

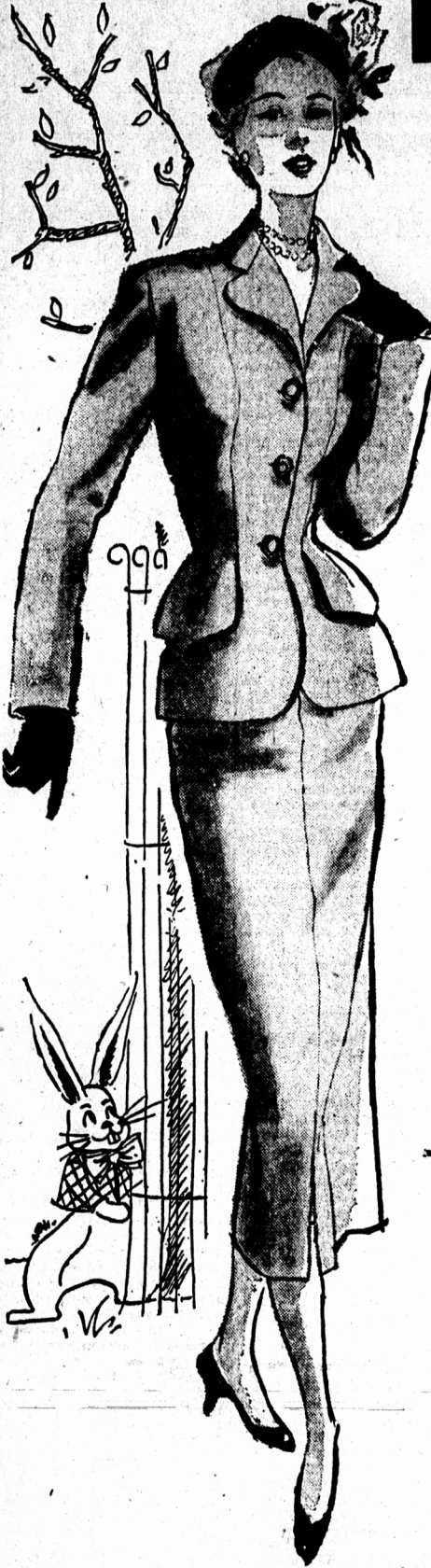
Outlook For This Year

If no tax changes were made in 1950-51, he estimated revenues would total \$2,430,000,000. Many estimates of expenditures for the coming year, which do not take into account unforeseen expenditures, have been fixed at \$2,308,000,000.

This would leave a budgetary surplus of \$122,000,000 before any tax changes and before provision for unforeseen expenditures.

In the 6,500-word fiscal portion of his speech, Mr. Abbott made these points:

- 1. During the current year \$496,000,000 obtained from various government transactions was used to reduce the outstanding public debt.
- 2. In the last two years, a fall in Canadian overseas exports of about \$300,000,000 has been more than offset by an increase of \$500,000,000 in Canadian exports to the United States.
- 3. The government has been a "little disappointed in the apparent inability of overseas countries to resume their traditional share" of the Canadian import market during the last year.
- 4. It already seems clear that devaluation of the dollar last September has, under present conditions, improved Canada's trading position.
- 5. Canada's gold and dollar reserves at a low of \$100 million in December 1947, had climbed to \$1,204,200,000 at the close of business March 25, an increase of \$87,000,000 in the last quarter.
- 6. Average weekly wages rose about three per cent during the year while the cost of living advanced "barely" one per cent.
- 7. The outlook for 1950 seems to be that the volume of employment will increase moderately, but it is possible it may not catch up with growth in total labor supply.
- 8. Concensus of informed views about the outlook for 1950 is that employment, output and price levels in both Canada and United States will show no great change from 1949.
- 9. Government revenues remain

first settlers, though I have never read where they actually liked bear meat.

Rounding up the porkers in late fall was quite a task. If you've ever tried to drive a pig you'll certainly know what a hectic time of it our forefathers had. If you want your porker to take a left turn the critter is sure to go to the right. If you try to drive it ahead of you, it will turn about and run in the opposite direction; if you make a clean bed for it, it will lie down in the dirtiest place it can find. Why? Well, it seems to be a natural instinct in pigs

to do the very opposite of what their owners intend they should do.

Sometimes it took the whole family an entire day to bring home the bacon. Sometimes animals got lost, or went completely wild in which case their owners let them be. Pigs were not worth getting excited about. The woods were full of them, and few settlers knew whether the new crop belonged to themselves or to a neighbor. So long as there was plenty of pork to supply the demand it mattered little who owned them.

Some years they had trouble with the bears stealing the smaller porkers. Bruin sometimes got very hungry and boldly walked into a settlement to help himself. Such incidents caused plenty of excitement and there would be a general rush for guns. Most settlers prided themselves on being good shots, but once in a while Mr. Bruin got away with his skin—and the pig too.
