Seated N.S. Leaders Keep Wild-Slinging in Campaign

HALIFAX (CP)—Two Nova Scotia lawyers who first won in a provincial election 14 years ago—and have since been defeated—are again the principals in the campaign for the Oct. 4 provincial election. True to form, Progressive Conservative Premier Robert L. Stanfield, 49, and Liberal Opposition Leader Earl W. Urquhart, 42, are again leading an unrespectful, but in the quiet way that stamps them both they're making their pitches to the voters.

Neither has ever shown any aptitude for mud-slinging, and personalities have been pretty well out of the campaign thus far. Except for one brief clash the two leaders—both of them first elected to the Nova Scotia legislature in the 1954 election—have stuck to a policy-versus-policy contest.

The one flare-up came early in the campaign. It was centred on a toughly subject—new industry for the coal and steel belt of Cape Breton. A long-rumored plan to build a new steel mill was definitely slated for Cape Breton, said newspaper reports.

The premier confirmed his government is negotiating for such a plant. This confirmation, charged Mr. Urquhart, was a "breach of confidence"—a confidence that had developed talks by Mr.

Stanfield's government to assist industry has given help to more than 30 industrial plants across the province.

But Mr. Urquhart claims that IEL-sponsored plants have been concentrated in one part of Nova Scotia. He says a Liberal government would decentralize industry, giving new plants to areas that need them most.

Neither leader has as yet announced an official platform, but both are expected to do so within the next few days. The premier, however, will mean establishment of a new department of fisheries for the province. Mr. Urquhart says the premier is "stealing" his idea from the Liberals. His party, Mr. Urquhart says, has had a fisheries department in its program for three years.

NO SURPRISE
The election comes three years after the last.

The bidding: South West North East
1♥ Pass 2♠ Pass
2♥ Pass 3♦ Bid.
Opening lead—ace of diamonds.
You get lucky, some I'm even when you're in a horrible contract, and all you can do is be grateful that somebody up stairs is busy looking out for your interests.

With one opened the bidding with a heart and North responded two clubs. South reasoned that about all he needed for a grand slam was a five-card club suit headed by the A-Q, or lacking that, any number of a grand many holdings North might have that would produce three tricks.

Pursuing his aim, South bid four notrump, intending to bid seven hearts if North showed two hearts by responding five hearts. But North had only one heart. This contract would surely have been defeated, except that West, influenced by his partner's double, led the ace of diamonds.

It was manna from heaven. Not that the lead of the ace prevented South with his thirteenth trick—the diamond king was now only too willing to put him in a position where he would manufacture the thirteen tricks he needs for a grand slam.

He ruffed the diamond, cashed the ace of hearts, played a club to the ace, discarded a spade on the king of diamonds, and played a spade to the ace. When he then cashed five more rounds of trumps, this became the position:

Table showing card positions for North, West, East, and South after several tricks.

The lead of the last heart placed West in a squeeze position from which he could not escape, and South made a grand slam as a result.
