

TELEGRAPHIC NEWS.

UNITED STATES.

LONG BRANCH, Sept. 10. Official bulletin, 8.30 a. m.—At the examination of the President at 8 this a. m., the temperature was 90.4, 10, pulse 104, respiration 18. He slept well during the night, awaking only at intervals of one half to one hour. There is a perceptible increase of strength with the improved condition of the digestive apparatus. The tumefaction of the parotid has entirely disappeared, and suppuration is greatly diminished. The wound continues to improve and presents a more healthy appearance.

UNOFFICIAL BULLETIN, 1.15 p. m.—There are various rumors here to-day regarding the President's condition. While the attending surgeons have not been seen personally for an hour or so, reliable information has been received by a reporter of the Associated Press that the President is continuing to improve and that nothing unfavorable has been observed in his symptoms. The rain has ceased, but it is still very close, and the atmosphere is oppressively heavy.

NEW YORK, Sept. 10. The Post's Long Branch special says: It is learned that a slight induration was perceptible this morning along the track of the psoas muscle, near the groin, over the place the ball is supposed to be. What it means cannot be learned, if the doctors themselves know. The catheter, it has been discovered, does not now drop more than ten inches into the wound and the granulation has not been sufficient to account for the healing of the wound to such an extent. Is there another pus cavity forming? There are increased pulse and temperature.

LONG BRANCH, N. J., Sept. 11. Official bulletin, 9 a. m.—At the examination of the President to-day, his temperature was 98.8; pulse, 104; respiration, 19. He was more restless, and the febrile rise later than on the preceding night. He continues to take sufficient nourishment without gastric disturbance.

THE FOLLOWING WAS SENT OUT AT 10.30:— TO MR. LOWELL, MINISTER, LONDON:— The President had an increase of fever last night and was very restless until 5 a. m. During the day he has been somewhat better, but his pulse, temperature and respiration have been higher for the entire 24 hours than any preceding day since he reached Long Branch. His other symptoms are not reassuring and his general condition gives rise to anxiety.

BULLETIN, 12.10 a. m.—There is change for the worse in the President's condition. It is evident that the day has been very unfavorable. In the first place the lungs are acknowledged to be affected; second, the affection is not claimed to be under control, hence it is liable to increase; third, if it increases abscesses will undoubtedly be the result and may form around the lungs, the liver, or other vital parts. In fact, it is an undecided question, to-night, whether or not abscesses have not already formed, and the evidence appears to be that they have. The situation, again, is critical, to say the least, and unless there is proof established to the contrary, there is good ground for believing that pyemia has set in. Dr. Bliss stated that the President's cough had subsided somewhat; that the dulness from the lungs extended over a small area and he did not think it would amount to anything serious. At 11 o'clock the President was sleeping and his pulse and temperature, it was reported, had decreased.

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 10. Two more supposed train robbers were brought in to Independence last night. Their names are Charley Fisk and William Stillwell. Marshal Murphy and posse left Independence last night to arrest the remainder whose names they have from Chapman who confessed.

LOUISVILLE, Sept. 10. The New Orleans lightning passenger train coming north was wrecked last night at Sonora, on the Louisville and Nashville Railroad, at a switch which had been misplaced. The baggage car, two coaches and two Pullman sleepers were piled on the locomotive. John Slade, the engineer, was killed; Oscar Lilley, the fireman, was wounded mortally. No passengers were hurt.

NEW ORLEANS, Sept. 11. The impression prevails that the labor troubles will culminate in a row to-morrow. The police and several military companies are held in readiness for its suppression.

CHICAGO, Sept. 10.

The case of Rev. Dr. Thomas was given to the jury at a late hour last night. After a brief deliberation a verdict was returned convicting him of the charge of disseminating ideas contrary to the doctrines of the Methodist religion. The charge being sustained by this verdict it has the effect of sending the case to the Conference.

There was considerable excitement during the speech of prosecuting counsel Parkhurst who made use of these words: "There are grey-haired, godly men in this city; there are broken-hearted mothers in this city, who are weeping over the ruin of their sons, whose downfall in theatre going, dancing and beer drinking card playing began with their accepting these views from Dr. Thomas."

The speaker was loudly hissed at times and retorted sharply upon the audience.
