He competed against five of the best Clydesdale horses that are owned in the Maritime Provinces, and it reflects great credit on Mr. Stockman who purchased the horse out of the late Queen Victoria's stables, for the Local Government, whilst in England, to know that he was able to successfully compete with the horses of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick. We learn that the horse that carried off the first prize, was awarded it because he weighed heavier than Crown Rights but that in all other respects Mr. Holloran's horse is a finer looking animal, and we congratulate him on being its owner."

We the owners of Crown Rights don't wish to boast of this as a wonderful record, although the record is good. Neither do they have to employ an official to exhibit their stock. As the public are aware they have been successful exhibitors in former years as well as this one without the help of an aide-camp. At any rate it is an insult to our painstaking and competent groom to say that he required any one when away from home. If such was the case he would have needed some one as Mr. Stockman arrived home on Saturday evening and Mr. Wm. Bateman in charge of Crown Rights and Barrister's Champion did not arrive till Tuesday morning, they being part of the delayed exhibition stock. Your correspondent informs you that Crown Rights competed against five of the best Clydesdale horses owned in the Maritime Provinces, but omitted to say that they were all imported from the Mother Country by the Nova Scotia Government. As regards Mr. Stockman we wish to give him much credit for his selection. But in order to more fully display the truth we wish it understood that Mr. Stockman did not purchase him out of the late Queen Victoria's stable, but from Mr. Peter Crawford, Dargavel, Dunfries, a renowned Scottish breeder and dealer in Clydesdale horses, who purchased him from the late Queen Victoria. As regards the horse that carried off first prize we would like to know his authority for stating such. At any rate the owners are content to leave that to Dr. Reid, providing he wishes to make it public.

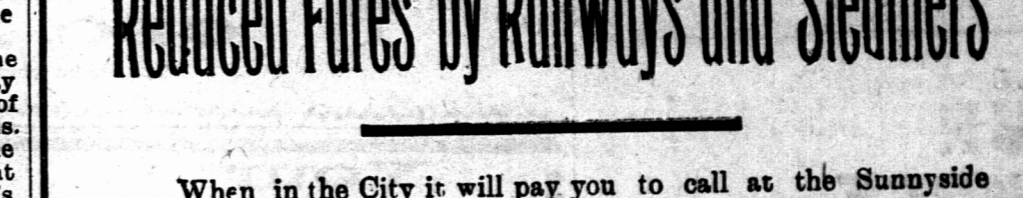
