MONDAY

Mr. Cartney McLure, Dover, died in hospital on Saturday following an accident outside a dance hall in Dover on Friday night.

A truck, driven by Mr. Roy Buell, Albany, was leaving the dance shortly after midnight when the driver felt it run over something. He stopped the truck to investigate and found Mr. McLure lying on the ground.

Mr. Buell went into the hall for help and Mr. Wm. Keenan took the injured man in his car to King's County Hospital in Montague, where he died on Saturday morning.

Mr. McLure, who was 52 years of age, is survived by his wife and eight daughters. An inquest will be held on Thursday evening at 7 p.m. in the Canadian Legion Hall, Montague.

Following the successful completion of qualifying examinations in June, 1949, he was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant and having qualified in the Lieutenant in May of this year, Capt. McCarville was recommended to be promoted to his present rank.

Canada's per capita fish consumption still stands among the lowest of any country in the world.

Mr. Arthur H. Peake was re-elected president and Mr. A. Waltham Gaudet, vice president at the annual meeting of the Law Society of Prince Edward Island yesterday. Mr. John P. Nicholson was elected secretary-treasurer succeeding Mr. Charles R. McQuaid. Additional members of the Council of the Society are Mr. D. O. Stewart, K. W. E. Bentley, K.C., and Mr. J. A. Bentley, K.C. Mr. R. Bell, K.C., was re-appointed auditor.

Oral reports were presented by the president, the secretary-treasurer, and by Mr. Nicholson, chairman of the library committee, the latter giving rise to considerable discussion on the unsatisfactory state of law books and accommodation. This matter was left in the hands of the Council to deal with.

It was decided that the Council be instructed to appoint committees on the Law Library, Canadian Bar Association representation, governing bodies of the legal profession and on legislation. The president emphasized the special importance of the last named committee because of a forthcoming revision of the statute law of the Province.

Scouting, with its army of Canadian youth over 100,000 strong and its smaller army of adult leaders devoting their time, effort and money to the maintenance and development of the movement, was the theme of an inspiring address at the Charlottetown Rotary Club luncheon yesterday by Mr. Jackson Dodds, C.B.E., retired general manager of the Bank of Montreal and Deputy Chief Scout for Canada.

Taking as his subject "Preparing for Tomorrow Today," Mr. Dodds warned that the enemies of democracy are working unceasingly to spread their propaganda and expand their influence. Scouting, which is recognized as one of the best safeguards against totalitarian infiltration, needs above all things more leaders, and in this connection the speaker made a strong appeal for greater support from business and professional men.

"Few of us can be unaware of what will happen to this country unless some positive forces are brought to bear on the development of young citizens," he said. "We are too well aware of the destructive forces in our midst—of those men and women to whom the spiritual and democratic is anathema—people who thrive on hate, twisted minds which hate all men who believe in freedom. These people never stop in their efforts to lead you down those lanes of rosy promise, to the eventual slavery of the totalitarian state."

OTTAWA, July 18—(CP)—About 200 former Maritimers from Western Canada and parts of United States, returning to their home provinces for a vacation, passed through Ottawa today.

A speech of welcome was made by Assistant Commissioner L. H. Nicholson of the R. C. M. P. formerly of Sussex, N.B. His daughter, Mrs. M. J. Nicholson, of Halifax, presented a bouquet of roses to Mrs. Kate Lewis, 78, formerly of Sydney, N.S., and now of Edmonton, the oldest lady on the train.

A speech of thanks was made by I. B. Howatt of Edmonton where the trip was organized by the Maritime Provinces Association of Alberta. Mr. Howatt is returning for a vacation at French River, P. E. I.

The regular meeting of the Laborers Protective Union, was held in the L. P. U. hall, 48 Water St. last night. The regular Union business was carried on, and reports of committees received.

The matter of a marine slip was taken up by the President who stated that as the Federal representatives were now at home the Union should take the initiative in pressing on the Federal Government the need of having this slip to repair ships operating out of Island ports, also the need of winter employment in Charlottetown.

It was decided after considerable discussion to hold a meeting of all tradesmen and laborers in the L. P. U. Memorial Hall in the near future and have Mr. Lester Doucette, M.P., Mr. W. Chester S. McClure, M.P., Mr. J. O. Hyndman, Mr. Leonard McKay and others interested address this meeting. The President also stated the need of winter employment in Charlottetown was of the utmost importance to this Union, as work ended in December, and a marine slip would answer that need.

Construction work on the new Prince County Hospital is proceeding satisfactorily and it is expected that the building will be completed early in 1951.

At the present time the plastering is about half done. The plumbing and heating is pretty well along with the exception of the boiler room. The heating unit, which is oil burning, is on order and is the same type recently installed in the Charlottetown Hotel. The concrete floors are pretty well completed. All floors except the utility rooms and lavatories are of concrete and will be covered with battleship linoleum. The floors of the utility room and lavatories will be tile. The elevator is on order but has not yet arrived. There is provision being made for two elevators but only one will be installed at first.

This new 118 bed hospital of brick and steel construction is located on Summer Street, north, and is composed of four floors. On the ground floor there will be kitchen, dining room, laundry, morgue, locker rooms, food storage and refrigeration rooms. The main floor will have the offices, X-ray department, laboratories as well as rooms and wards. The operating room will be on the second floor with more rooms and wards, and on the third floor will be located the maternity department.

The largest ward in the institution will consist of five beds and there will be seven of these as well as seven four bed wards. There is no provision for living quarters for student nurses in this building. The general contractors are M. F. Schurman Co. Ltd., who are also doing the plumbing and heating. Their foreman is Mr. Norman MacLeod. The sub-contractors for the wiring are Bryant Electric Company of Halifax. East-ern Sheet Metal Workers Ltd. of New Glasgow, N.S., have the sub-contract for the ventilation. Mr. Wilfred Maynard is the inspector for the hospital board and approximately 50 men are employed on the job in all capacities at present.

ISLANDER SAFE—It has been learned that Brigadier H. H. Angle who was killed in the crash of an Indian National Airways plane near Kashmir this week was the chief of the United Nations Party of military observers which includes Major Claude Ives of Charlottetown. Claude's parents, Mr. T. G. Ives, left here about a year ago to join the party. He is the only Maritime observer there and was originally scheduled to return home early in August. But orders have been changed recently and he will be there for an additional six months.

Mr. Aubin J. Gallant, student at St. Joseph's University, Memramcook, N.B., recently went on a concert tour throughout the Provinces of New Brunswick and Quebec. "St. Joseph's University Choir," in which Mr. Aubin Gallant is a member, gave thirty-six concerts in one month. The tour lasted from June 5 to July 6. The first concert was given in Saint John, N.B., at which a very large crowd attended.

It was decorated with nuts and roses and lighted with 86 candles for the occasion. The remainder of the evening was spent in chatter, violin solos, vocal solos, and dancing. After a very enjoyable evening the various members of the family dispersed to their homes.

Plans for the setting up of a co-operative dairy in Charlottetown may be laid within the next eighteen months, stated Mr. J. G. Dennis, supervisor of Cooperatives, at the first annual meeting of the Central Farmers Co-operative Association held in the Vocational School last night.

"The farmers are looking for such a milk plant," he stated, "and the consumers in Charlottetown need one. We will also expand our facilities to deal in feeds, fertilizers, seeds, farm machinery and many other things."

"The store on Queen Street is only the beginning in Charlottetown. The movement started out of the necessity of doing something for the surplus milk of the farmer but we have a bigger job to do."

Island Co-operative Services expect to hit the million mark in volume of business done before the end of July, stated Mr. Jerome O'Brien, manager of the Island Co-op Services. "That is a lot of business in a few short months," he added as he recalled that the organization had been operating less than one year.

Hundreds of people were on hand at the C. N. R. station last evening to welcome home over seventy returning Prince Edward Islanders who had taken advantage of the "Spud Island Special"

which left Edmonton, Alberta, on July 15th. Rolling into the station right on schedule, the train was met by His Worship Mayor B. Earle MacDonald and Mrs. MacDonald, and City Clerk J. A. Fullerton. The Reece Band was on hand to live up to the homecoming, playing such selections as "There'll Be A Hot Time in the Old Town Tonight". Mayor MacDonald greeted personally as many of the travellers as he could before they were whisked off by friends and relatives, extending to them all a very hearty welcome on behalf of the City of Charlottetown.

7,331.200 pounds of lobsters, representing a value of \$1,567,899 and constituting perhaps an all-time record, were harvested this spring by Prince Edward Island fishermen, according to figures compiled in the office of Mr. J. J. Larabee, Supervisor of Fisheries. Both in volume and value, the catch, represents a large increase over any year since 1946.

During the season, which opened May 1 and closed June 30, 24,200 forty-eight pound cases were packed, an increase over the 1949 season of 6,175 cases. The total amount canned, including meat, paste and tomalley, was 4,840,000 pounds. 1,299,200 pounds of the catch were disposed of in shell, a large amount being shipped by truck to New England and Central Canadian markets. In addition, 1,204,200 pounds were shipped out to Nova Scotia. On June 30, 43,500 pounds were being held in pond. Air shipment of live lobsters was also heavy this spring.

It was particularly gratifying, Mr. Larabee noted, that despite the heavy catch, prices have been so well maintained. The revenue of over a million and a half dollars from this one branch of the fisheries alone, for the spring season, is a matter of great importance in the economy of the Island.

The new seamen's mess at H. M. C. S. "Queen Charlotte" was officially opened last evening by Capt. Doris Griffin, Borden, a daughter, Nancy Ann, weight 7 lbs. 2 oz. Although the painting and decorating of the mess itself have not yet been completed, the lounge which the men have worked on in their spare time is finished, and speaks extremely well for what might be expected of the balance. Said to be one of the finest in Eastern Canada, the lounge has an atmosphere of comfort and friendliness. Painted in pastel green and beige, it is furnished with warm brown leather-upholstered easy chairs and sofas, and carpeted in reddish brown. Wood used in the furniture is all in limed oak finish. The collection of books all add up to a comfortable room in which to sit and relax. Pastel green plastic curtains are used, and lamps placed at strategic points for reading.

Speaking to the members of the mess and their wives after he had opened the lounge, Capt. Connelly compared the entire barracks with the condition it was in 1938 when it was first taken over, and commended the men very highly on the work they had done to make it a barracks of which they could be justly proud. "A great deal of enthusiasm and time has been spent in preparing your new mess," he said, "and I congratulate you on the results of your foresight which has proved a mess which will help both you and your successors much pleasure."

Accompanying Capt. Connelly was Mrs. Connelly, Lieut. C. Binmore and Mrs. Binmore. A large number of the members of the mess were present with their wives and girlfriends, and refreshments and dancing were the order of the evening.
