

Truck Driver Absolved In Death At Hampton

A coroner's jury last night absolved a truck driver of any blame in the highway death of a four-year-old John Gordon Morrison at Hampton, Dec. 18.

Everett Jerry Gillespie of Charlottetown, a driver for Keith MacKinnon Transport Limited, told the jury he had been driving through Hampton on Dec. 18 at a speed not over the posted limit when two children ran out from behind a parked vehicle into the path of his truck.

He said he swerved left to avoid the children and applied the brakes, but it was too late and the little boy was struck.

The victim was the son of Mr. and Mrs. James (Budi) Morrison of Hampton. At the time of the accident he had been going to the Hampton Hall from his grandparents' store across the street. He had been accompanied by one of his sisters, but the girl apparently stopped at the roadside as the little boy dashed across the road.

Mr. Gillespie said he had blown his horn just before coming to a stop.

George Reid of Charlottetown, the second witness last night, said he parked his truck in front of the store to unload supplies. He said he normally parked for part of the steps, but on this particular day a car was in the way and he was forced to park obscuring the view of the steps from the road.

Mr. Reid confirmed that Gillespie had blown his horn on the way into Hampton. He also said he had not known the children had left the store and were going to cross the street from behind his truck.

GOOD CONDITION

Ivan Nevrick of Borden, a mechanic, testified that he checked the condition of the truck involved in the accident later that day and that it was in good mechanical order.

Cst. Alan Burchill of the Borden detachment RCMP who investigated the accident, entered as evidence several photographs of the accident scene and a drawing. He said skid marks from the truck were about 85 feet long.

The coroner was Dr. C.A. Cuddy of Charlottetown while the jurors were: George Arthur Carter, foreman; Harold Walter Gould; Emile Lawless; Lynn George; Alexander MacLennan; James Victor Campbell and Edwin Malcolm Ferguson, all of Hampton, and Erland James Cousins of Capraud.

Dr. Malcolm Putnam, who attended the youth at hospital, said yesterday he appeared to be in satisfactory condition but would be kept in hospital overnight for observation.

The youth was reported to have been sitting in his father's snowmobile, which was idling, when he was overcome by fumes from the engine. Cutcliffe's ambulance was called and on the way to hospital, the youth was administered oxygen by St. John's.

The youth is the son of Mr. and Mrs. William Wood.

It is believed the youth stepped into the path of the vehicle, driven by William Lavolette, Borden and Summerside detachments of the RCMP investigated the accident.

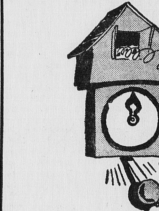
Another Cold Day Forecast
