## Handicraft Courses Will Start In January

It is expected that by Jan. 7, five handicraft courses will be ready to start in the province. Early in the New Year, handicraft instructors from the New Brunswick department of trade and industry will be available for some of the courses.

This province already has several instructors, and as soon as community groups are organized, classes will begin. The provincial handicraft director, Mrs. Muriel Lister, has asked that groups organize themselves into the required number for each course and appoint a person to act as liaison between the group and the handicraft division.

Courses that will be starting next month and the number that can be accommodated in each group are: textile painting, 20; leathercraft, 16; jewelry, 16; wood turning, 16; weaving, five.

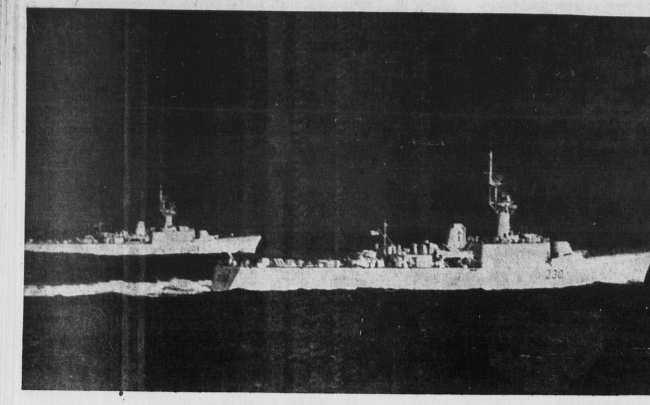

## Nickel Industry Outlook Is Good

**CIPPER CLIFF, Ont. (CP)**—Use of nickel in 1963 is expected to equal or exceed the levels of recent years, Henry S. Wingate, chairman of International Nickel Company of Canada Ltd., says in a year-end statement.

Long-range prospects for increased consumption continue excellent, he states.

In 1962 free world nickel consumption was about 430,000,000 pounds, the third highest in history, compared with 505,000,000 pounds in 1961.

Consumption increased in both the United States and Canada and they accounted for more than half the free world's total consumption, but demand slackened in Europe.

The 1962 consumption rate, commented, is about 80 per cent of the free world's present production capacity, exclusive of Cuba. Canadian accounts for more than 75 per cent of the free world capacity.

International Nickel's carrying capacity of two other principal Canadian producers, Falconbridge Nickel Mines Ltd. and Sherritt Gordon Mines Ltd., is estimated at 70,000,000 and 25,000,000 pounds respectively.

Capacity of other free-world producers is estimated as follows: Societe Le Nickel, New Caledonia, 55,000,000 pounds; Hanna Mining Company, Rio de Janeiro, 22,000,000; Japanese refiners, using imported ores 50,000,000.

Mr. Wingate said reports indicate that Cuba is continuing to produce nickel in the form of nickel oxide sinter in the United States government facilities seized by the Castro regime, and some of this nickel was offered for sale in 1962 in Western Europe through Czechoslovakia.

Stainless steel continued to outrank all other applications of nickel but with a drop in its preparation. Estimates of percentage consumption in various fields, with 1961 comparatives in brackets, are:

Stainless steels 30 per cent (33); nickel plating 15 (15); construction steels 13 (14); iron and steel castings 12 (11); copper and brass products four (four); all others nine (nine).

## Prominent Nfld. Businessman Dies

**ST. JOHN'S, Nfld. (CP)**—Chief A. Crosby, one of Newfoundland's most prominent businessmen and a member of one of the best-known families in the province, died in Honolulu Wednesday, he was 57.

Mr. Crosby was president of Crosby and company Limited, a fish mercantile business established in 1932 by his father, the late Sir John A. Crosby, a former prime minister of Newfoundland.

He was president also of Eastern Provincial Airways and Chimo Shipping Limited. Another of his companies, Newfoundland Engineering and Construction Company Limited, is among the largest construction firms in the province.

Mr. Crosby was elected in 1946 to the National Convention, a body investigating Newfoundland's future, and was president of the party advocating economic union with the United States.

At Confederation with Canada in 1949, he refused to sign with other members of the delegation named to finalize the terms of union because he disagreed with one of the terms.

First married in 1927, he had recently been divorced and remarried. Survivors include two sons and a daughter.

Premier Smallwood said Mr. Crosby was one of Newfoundland's "greatest sons."

"But he was much more than a great businessman," Mr. Smallwood said in a telephone interview from Montreal. "He was a great Newfoundland and one of my dearest friends."

## Flying Saucer Investigator Passes At 52

**OTTAWA (CP)**—Wilbert Brockhouse Smith, 52, superintendent of radio regulations engineering in the transport department, a flying saucer investigator and a founding father of the suburban police village of City View, died in hospital Thursday.

A native of Lethbridge, Alta., he was credited with doing much to encourage improvements in the technical side of broadcasting in Canada. He joined the federal department in 1939.

Mr. Smith was one of the organizers of the police village of City View, southwest of Ottawa. He also was noted for his investigations of "unidentified flying objects" in the early 1950s.
