

# Fall Term Of Supreme Court Opens At S'side

A true bill was returned by the Grand Jury against Benjamin (Benny) Grady of Summerside charged with attempted rape, at the opening day of the fall sitting of the Supreme Court in Summerside, Mr. Justice George J. Tweedy presiding.

After the accused entered a plea of "not guilty" the hearing was adjourned until this morning at 11 o'clock.

The charge resulted from an alleged assault on a young Summerside housewife on the evening of November 15 in an alleyway off Lower Central Street.

Representing the Crown at yesterday's sitting were Premier and Attorney-General A. W. Matheson and Mr. D. O. Stewart, O. C. Mr. W. Chester S. MacDonald is representing the accused.

The appeal of Gordon Sullivan of Summerside against a conviction of driving while impaired was granted due to contradictory evidence of Crown witnesses which failed to establish that the appellant was impaired when last driving a truck of the Summerside Electric Light Department.

The case resulted from the arrest of the appellant in a house on Notre Street while allegedly in charge of the truck which was parked on the street in front of the house where the arrest was made.

The appeal was from a conviction in Summerside Police Court on June 22, 1955, when the appellant was fined \$50 and costs with an automatic three months suspension of his operator's license. Four witnesses appeared for the Crown and one for the appellant. Mr. J. Augustine Gallant represented the accused.

Another appeal, that of George Warren of Alberton against a sentence imposed on September 12, 1955 after he pleaded guilty to making a false statement in an application for a farm improvement loan was stood down to be heard as the last case on the docket.

### CHARGE TO GRAND JURY

In his charge to the Grand Jury Mr. Justice Tweedy said "It is intended that I instruct you in the duties you are to perform.

Before I do this I would like to make a few observations which should be of interest to you as citizens who have been selected in this county to discharge very special and important functions of citizenship."

Judge Tweedy stated that F. E. I. retained the Grand Jury although some of the Jurors have not. He said that it was felt to be expensive, both in time and money, and in its demands on the citizens. He said "there is much to be said on the other hand in favor of the retention of the Grand Jury system, hallowed as it is by tradition. In the calling to the service of the Govern-

ment to assist in the administration of justice, citizens see at first hand how justice is administered and take a direct and active part in such an important function of government as the administration of justice."

He said the Grand Jury is an old and venerable institution, tested by time and experience, and should not be regarded lightly. It is, he stated, not so much a duty as a privilege to serve on it, and said "I am sure that you will be proud to exercise this privilege."

Judge Tweedy, before giving the Grand Jurors general directions as to their duties, read to them the sheriff's report covering the time since the last session of the Supreme Court in June.

This report by Sheriff W. A. Gordon showed that in 75 offences who served time in Prince County jail since the last sitting, 53 of these were jailed as the result of the misuse of alcohol. He said any recommendation the jury might have to help remedy this shocking condition would be handed to the proper authorities.

### GRAND JURY'S REPORT

The Grand Jury report was as follows:

"We inspected the living quarters, heating equipment and sanitary facilities and the jail cells, making a complete and careful inspection of the jail and premises.

"We find, as follows: That sanitary conditions, heating, etc., are as good as can be expected in a jail of this class, although there is much to be desired if practical considerations would permit.

"We recommend that a new fence be run from the south west corner of the jail building, south to the present fence. We also recommend that the present fence be increased in height and be furnished with a suitable over-hang as a further deterrent to escape of prisoners.

"We have given most careful consideration to the remarks of Your Lordship in regard to the large number of convictions during the past six months for offences which are the direct result of misuse of intoxicating liquor. However we find that it is beyond our ability to even suggest a remedy for the situation.

"It has been brought to our attention that a considerable part of our paved roadways have no white line marking the center of the highway.

"Realizing the great advantage of such a line in preventing accidents we recommend that all paved highways be properly marked with a white center line as soon as possible after being constructed or repaired."

# "Children's Reading" Is Discussed In Address

Miss Dorothy Cullen, assistant supervisor of libraries, P. E. I., was the guest speaker at the monthly meeting of the Summerside Home and School last night and spoke on her subject "Children's Reading." Miss Cullen sketched briefly the history and organization of the island's public libraries, which were begun in 1833, and now comprise 24 branches extending from Tignish to Souris. She spoke of various ways of getting children interested in books, saying that some adults had established children's reading clubs where the children elect their own officers and conduct their meetings. Members sometimes read aloud, and various books were discussed. Sometimes special speakers were invited to talk to the children about books.

The speaker reminded her audience that this was "Young Canada's Book Week" which had been started to offset the danger of reading being neglected by children in the face of distractions such as radio and television. Miss Cullen quoted authorities on Children's Reading to the effect that "books help a child to grow, satisfy his insatiable curiosity, and provide for emotional needs. Good books convey a true sense of values, and give a steady power amid the uncertainties of our present age. Love of reading and a sense of humor were two important qualities to help people to cope with the realities of life."

"We must recognize, the speaker said, "that some children will never become avid readers, that they are fitted for more active interests and group activities. Miss Cullen concluded her address by mentioning and describing some of the more popular children's books.

Mr. Frank Cameron presided over the meeting and introduced the speaker. Mrs. Arthur Clark announced that the association proposed appointing a "used text book committee" the plan was to have the pupils turn the book they no longer needed in to the committee. The books would be repaired if necessary and sold to the pupils coming into the grade at greatly reduced prices. The plan will be brought up again in May.

### JAPAN EMBARKS ON Two-Party System

TOKYO (Reuters) — Japan embarked upon the two-party system Tuesday when the country's two biggest conservative political groups formally approved a merger, matching a step taken last month by the previously divided socialists.

About 2,000 delegates from the Liberal and Democratic parties, both conservative parties, voted for the foundation of the new Liberal-Democratic party. It will muster 300 votes in the 467-member lower house, against the opposition socialists' 155.

The present cabinet of Prime Minister Ichiro Hatoyama, a Democrat, will resign Nov. 21. Parliament will meet the next day to appoint a government.

# Restrictions On Austrians Eased

VIENNA (Reuters) — George Magann, Canadian minister to Austria and Switzerland, said here Tuesday that existing restrictions on Austrian immigration to Canada will cease immediately.

The employment situation in Canada has improved, he said, and the government now is prepared to offer travel loans and assistance in Canada to immigrants and their families who meet the health and character qualifications.

Since the end of the Second World War more than 37,000 persons have emigrated to Canada as refugees and stateless persons. The new regulations are expected to swell the stream.
