The Colonial Exhibition.

The Canadian Gazette says that preparations for the Colonial Exhibition of 1886, in London, are being pushed forward, and that, as far as Canadian interests are concerned, the composition of the committee leaves nothing to be desired. The Prince of Wales has requested the Canadian Government to appoint an executive commissioner, who is to be assisted by no more than two or three other commissioners, and upon whom the chief responsibilities as to the Canadian exhibit will devolve. Canada has been awarded some 50,000 feet of space in a very convenient and eligible position, with facilities for the exhibition of machinery in motion, and other advantages; and the Dominion is likely to figure in this exhibition in a manner worthy of her position as the premier British colony.

Prices of Farm Produce.

The United States department of agriculture reports the average price of corn 26 cents, the highest being in Florida, 30 cents, and the lowest in Nebraska, 15 cents. The average farm price of wheat is 65 cents per bushel, against 91 cents last December. The average of home grown wheat in New England exceeds a dollar, in New York 85 cents, and in Pennsylvania 86 cents. The average value of oats is 28 cents, against 33 last December. The present value is the lowest ever reported by the department. The lowest state average is 19 in Nebraska, and the highest 65 in Florida. The plantation price of cotton averages 9 cents to 9½ cents a pound. The average farm price of the entire crop of potatoes is 40 cents a bushel. The lowest is 25 cents in Michigan. The average in New York is 39 cents.

Divorce in France.

The number of divorce cases down on the list for trial in France is 760, of which 569 are petitions to transform judicial separations into divorces, and 209 are original petitions. The petitioners make their appearance on Wednesday mornings, and the student of modern Paris life has an opportunity of closely observing some strange social types. The subject is to be transferred to canvas in next year's Salon. The number of demands for judicial separation has increased, the reason being that, whereas divorce petitions involve much litigation and red tape, a separation for more than two years constitutes a divorce.

Bishop Campbell on Methodism.

Bishop Campbell, of the African M. E. Church, speaking at the Methodist Centennial Conference, Baltimore, in reference to the work accomplished in the colored churches, said that Methodism had done much for his race, and he proposed to fill a paper with the records of the conference, showing what had been accomplished. The colored man may thank the Baptists and Quakers, but Methodism has been his most faithful and constant friend.

A Railway Contract.

It is reported that the Dominion Government have offered to give a contract for a railway from Oxford to New Glasgow to any company that will take over the work already done by the Short Line Company and pay the debts due upon the work. It is also reported that the members for Pictou, Cumberland and Colchester have finally abandoned the Short Line Company.

Valuable Wedding Presents.

On the occasion of the marriage of Mr. Atkins, son of the Lieut.-Governor of Manitoba, to Miss McLellan, daughter of the Minister of Marine and Fisheries, which took place at Ottawa one day last week, the newly married couple were the recipients of many valuable presents, including a cheque for \$40,000 and a fine piano made in France, N. S., from the father of the bride.

Canadian Immigration.

Official returns show that the total number of immigration settlers arriving in Canada during the past eleven months was 84,198, or 19 per cent less than last year.
