Further Study In Producing Pea-Seed Urged

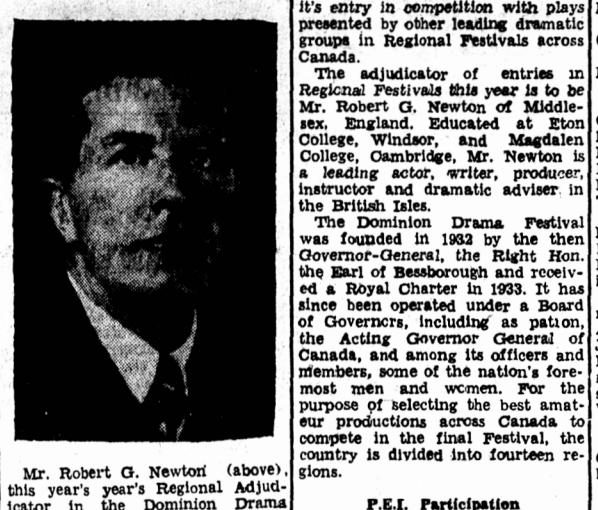
Further study in pea-seed production in the Province was recommended yesterday by members of the horticulture and agriculture committee in their report to the Agricultural Conference at Birch Court.
