A tribute to Mr. Gladstone's genius as the ablest Finance Minister the country has ever had is implied in the fact that the announcement of his having accepted the Premiership and charge of the Exchequer was immediately followed by a rise of 4 per cent. in the Funds.

When a Cabinet Minister holds a double office he draws pay-and-a-half. Mr. Gladstone as First Lord of the Treasury will have £5,000 a year, and as Chancellor of the Exchequer, £2,500 a year, in all £7,500. By his holding two offices there will thus be a saving of £2,500 per annum.

The schooner "Annie Florence," Grady, master, owned by D. Montgomery, Esq., of this town, arrived here on Sunday last from Halifax, with a cargo consisting of an outfit for Mr. Montgomery's new vessel, and merchandise for the business men of Summerside and Alberton.

The bark "Journal," Gallant, master, owned by Angus McMillan, Esq., sailed for Montague on Wednesday morning, where she is to complete her cargo. She took in 22,000 bushels of oats at this port.

MARKETS.

ST. JOHN, N. B.—Telegraph's report of May 26th:—

Butter.—The market is very active and choice grades very scarce. There has been a slight advance on the week of about 2 cents per lb. It is not expected that the advance can be maintained over a few days, as new butter must soon be more plentiful.

Eggs are slightly firmer and the demand continue good. There is but little shipment to the United States, as prices rule too low to ship at a profit.

Hams and shoulders continue in good demand—prices are slightly firmer—receipts light and not equal to the demand.

Potatoes.—E. Roses and S. Dollars and such kinds are without improvement; choice coppers and black kidneys for local trade have slightly advanced, and at present are quite scarce. There is no improvement to note in outside markets.

Poultry.—Very scarce; a few turkeys in the early part of the week sold from 15 to 16 cents; fowls, and such like, there was none offering.

Oysters firm; prices generally unchanged.

MONTREAL.—Report of the Gazette, May 24th:—

A good business was transacted in eggs to-day, which sold readily at 10 1/2c, at which figure they closed firm. In Boston the market is decidedly easier and prices are off, Canadian eggs being quoted there at 10 to 10 1/2c, which is a decline of 1c. In New York the same kind sells at 11c to 11 1/2c. A trial shipment of eggs has been made from here to Liverpool.

Happily he has been placed where he seems likely to do the most good for the Dominion in the trouble brought on by the Bay Fortune affair. The Gladstone Government not, it is feared, over stiff in the back-bone in disputes with the United States Government, and certainly not noted for its knowledge of Colonial questions, will have at hand in Sir A. T. Galt a very competent adviser on fishery matters. It is well that Canada is so ably represented in London just now by its High Commissioner. The appointment was the realization of a really happy idea. Sir Alexander, we note, is occupying a fine position in London society, and is being made much of in it.
