

they are determined to recognise the existence of no representative institutions.

SPLEEN AND ECONOMY.—It may be as well to remind the public, that whilst the Government kindly prohibits the intercourse by post throughout the Island, all the Mail Carriers are under contract for three years to carry the letters and papers; so that if they choose to continue to go their rounds, which we hope they will, they will have a legal claim, and must, in common honesty, be paid according to their contracts. Thus, to gratify animosity against the Assembly, the country is actually paying its letter carriers, whilst it is prohibited to put any thing in their bags!

COLONIAL POSTAL AFFAIRS.—When Sir Donald Campbell, by means of an obstructive policy totally at variance with his instructions, made it incumbent upon the Assembly to decline transacting public business with him, he was not probably aware that the baneful consequences of his administration would be felt, to some extent in the other provinces. Such, however, is the fact. Prosperous and powerful dependencies are at this moment suffering from the obstinacy of our august Governor. It appears that, by order of the Home Government, the transference the Post Office from Imperial to Colonial authority was to be simultaneous, or nearly so, in all the provinces; but that as the House of Assembly of this Island was needlessly prevented by the Lieutenant Governor from taking the necessary steps in the matter, so far as our own colony is concerned, the postal establishment of all the colonies must remain as it is for another year. The Canadian press complains of this, and well it may. Had Sir Donald only accepted the resignation of his Council, when that body themselves saw the necessity for retiring, the Post office and every other department of the public service would have received the necessary attention from the Legislature.
