TO SING THE MAYOR.—A Bangor, Me., despatch says: Dennis Tracy, a policeman whom Mayor Beal had discharged from the force last summer, entered the city hall tonight when the City Council was in session and made a violent and abusive attack upon the mayor. Tracy, who was either drunk or insane, told the mayor he would kill him, and for a few minutes it looked as if the Chicago tragedy would be repeated in Bangor. Finally Mayor Beal, taking Tracy by the collar, put him forcibly out of the building.

BABY FRODO.—Last Monday evening Messrs. Valentine Cameron and John Goodwin left Summerside for their home, Goodwin's Corner, near Wellington. They were under the influence of liquor. After arriving at Goodwin's Corner, Cameron went to walk to his home, about half a mile further on, and fell somewhere along the road, and was not found until next day, Tuesday, about 10 or 11 o'clock, after sleeping in the snow for nine or ten hours. He is a son of Philip Cameron, and is 25 years of age. He may lose one foot and the toe of the other, as well as one hand.—Guardian.

NEW DRILL FOR MILITIA.—The new Canadian infantry drill is shortly to be authorized. Books for the instructors have already been issued. There are several innovations which show that the drill is to be more workmanlike and less ornamental than at present. For instance, the men in falling in, will be placed with a distinct interval between them, and the rear rank will be no less than sixty inches from the front. The men will all be assigned places in certain sections and will fall in those sections, no matter whether others may be absent or not. Each sergeant will have charge of a section, and will be responsible for it. The formation throughout will be remarkable for an exercise which will be sent stiff, straight-up-and-down style does not permit.

WHEN ELEPHANTS ROAMED IN CANADA.—The great northern elephant perished as a species in the prime of life. It had lived under most prosperous conditions. Many months wandered into Ireland and Scotland; they tramped by the thousands through the thickets of the Weald, they roamed in great herds along the flats and valleys of Central Europe, and across the endless oak-land plains of Russia and the now ruined tundras of Siberia. Italy reared elephants of its own (Elephas meridionalis); another antique species of large size (Elephas antiquus) was met with from Yorkshire to the Atlas even Malta; three separate kinds, while the huge mastodon was the chief representative of the genus in North and South America.—The Edinburgh Review.

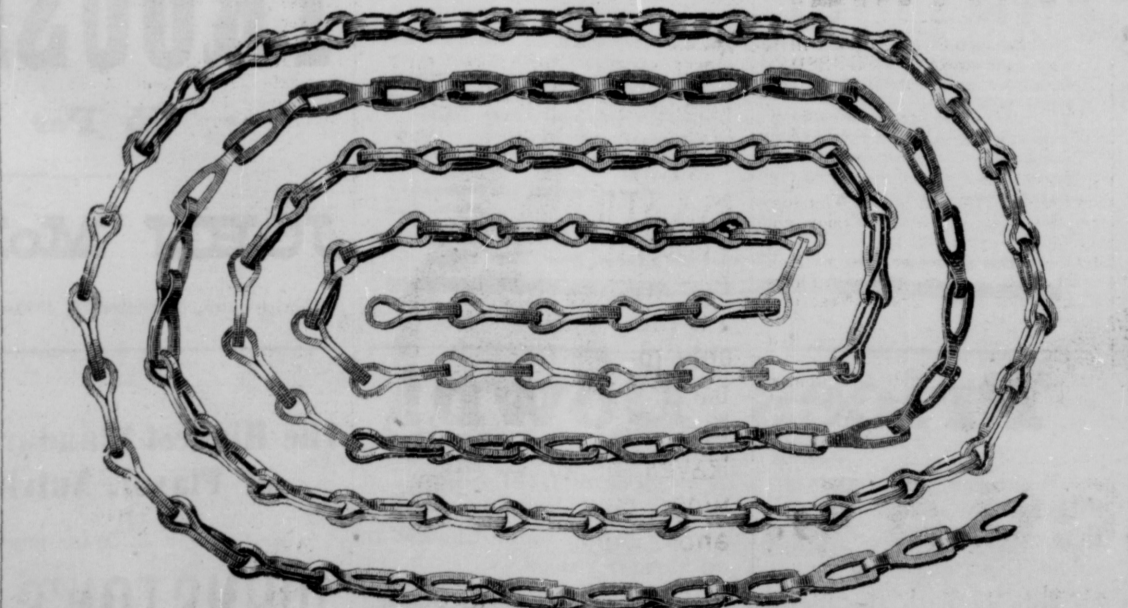
