Guests were shown to their seats by Collin Warren, brother of the bride, and Robert S. McCartney.

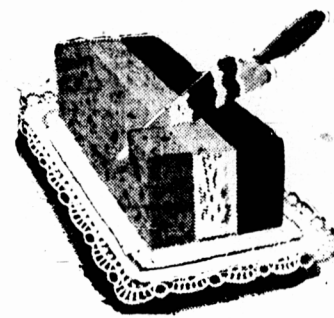
