## STATE OF WAR NOW EXISTING

### Between Spain and U. S.

#### HAVANA WILL BE ATTACKED.

The Spanish Minister and Suite Have Left Washington.

[SPECIAL TO THE EXAMINER.]

WASHINGTON, April 21.—Senator Polo the Spanish Minister to the United States, yesterday afternoon at half past three handed his passports to a messenger from the State Department, and at half past seven o'clock last evening left Washington accompanied by his suite. Consequently the state of war now exists between Spain and the United States and on Saturday, at seven o'clock, unless in the meantime Spain surrenders Cuba, the United States fleet will move on Havana.

#### THE SPANISH PARLIAMENT.

Opened Yesterday With Great Enthusiasm.

MADRID, April 21.—The opening of the Cortes yesterday was a magnificent sight. The Queen was wildly cheered. In speech the Queen expressed a hope that through patriotism of her people a glorious army and navy and a united people would eventually triumph, in their struggle with the enemies of Spain.

#### QUIET AT HAVANA.

Business in a State of Paralysis.

HAVANA, April 20.—Quiet prevails here. The streets present a more lively appearance than they did a few days ago. Prominent people believe war may yet be averted, but business is almost paralyzed and no contracts are being entered into and papers are being urged to declare war immediately.

#### Spanish Troops At Canary Island.

His Bizarre Position.

MADRID, April 19.—El Heraldo, pointing out the "bizarre position of Senator Poloy Barnabe at Washington, says: "Spain's minister is stopping his ears and closing his eyes while the government to which he is accredited passes resolutions ignoring his country's prescriptive rights."

#### The Carlists in England.

LONDON, April 19.—The Carlists in England are preparing for action, convinced that the present dynasty is doomed.

## WHEN FIGHTING WILL BEGIN

### Not Before Saturday.

#### UNLESS SPAIN COMMENCES.

Cuban Ports to be Blockaded—and a Surrender Demanded.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—One of the members of the Cabinet in speaking of the time limit allowed Spain, said that the United States government would not hold a stop watch in this emergency, and could well afford to give Spain three days to decide a question which may involve the destruction of the nation.

Meanwhile war preparations will go forward with renewed activity and both army and navy will be put in a position for active operations.

There seems to be little doubt that the first move will be a blockade of one or more Cuban ports and as soon as an army of occupation can be transported to them a demand will be made for an unconditional surrender. In the event of a refusal the work of reducing them by bombardment will be begun immediately.

It is not thought that the assembling of the naval forces will be delayed even for a day and it is not unlikely that important movements of both arms of the service will be ordered within the next few hours.

#### WOODFORD LEAVES MADRID

After Handing his Archives Over to the British Embassy.

MADRID, April 21.—The family of General Woodford the United States Minister to Spain, left Madrid last night, and the Minister bought a ticket for the South of France by the express train leaving Madrid to day. Before leaving, Minister Woodford handed the archives of his legation to the official chief of the British Embassy, where he dined last night.

#### BRITISH WARSHIP GOESSOUTH.

#### Still Unbelieving

NEW YORK, April 20.—There are men in Wall street still who believe that no gun will be fired in war between the United States and Spain. It is difficult to find what they base this assumption on, but they hold it with sufficient tenacity to decline to sell out their holdings in securities and buy additional securities at any additional decline.

## PARLIAMENT OF CANADA.

### Favoritism To Officials.

#### WHAT ABOUT THE PLEBISCITE.

It will Probably be held in September or October next or Later.

OTTAWA, April 21.—In the House of Commons yesterday the discussion of the statutory increases was resumed. The item for the salaries in the Governor General's office and Privy Council Office was passed.

The Department of Justice was next reached when it was found that of the six clerks qualified for an increase, four got a raise and two did not. This revived the discussion of discrimination and again an explanation of the basis of choice was given.

A long discussion took place on the item of militia salaries, respecting the superannuation of Accountant Omeara and the appointment Mr. Borden, of Kentville in his place at a larger salary to begin with than that paid to the Accountant of any other department.

When the House adjourned at midnight the militia clause had not been voted. Mr. Davin moved that it should be reduced \$600.

It is pretty certain that the plebiscite bill, to be introduced by Hon. Mr. Fisher, will provide for the submission of the question pure and simple.

The date of the election will be probably be September or October of this year or at some later date when the next electoral list has been prepared.

#### THE ATLANTIC COAST CITIES

To be Guarded by a Patrol Fleet Now Forming.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—The seaports of the Atlantic Coast of the U. S. are to be protected by a third fleet which has been ordered to be formed today. It will be a patrol squadron with headquarters at New York.

#### THE REHRING SEA AWARD.

The Appropriation has been Passed by the Senate.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—The Behring Sea Award has been passed. Yesterday the Senate passed a bill appropriating \$473,157 to be paid to Great Britain.

Feeling at Key West.

KEY WEST, Fla., April 20.—The effect of the latest news from Washington was soon noticed on board the ships lying in the inner harbor. The officers began sending their personal belongings ashore and the ships were stripped of whatever superfluous articles remained. The Cuban colony here is in a high state of elation. All the morning groups of excited patriots have been discussing the situation, while others have been marching through the streets shouting "Cuba Libre."

## UNITED STATES VOLUNTEERS.

### Emergency Bill Passed, Calling Them Out.

WASHINGTON, April 21.—The House of Representatives yesterday passed an emergency war measure bill, empowering the President to call out the volunteer forces of the States and providing for their organization.

Verdict of Guilty Without Capital Punishment.

BOSTON, April 21.—The case of Bram charged with murdering the captain of the Herbert Fuller was concluded here yesterday. The jury brought in a verdict of guilty, without capital punishment.

#### PREPARATIONS IN SPAIN.

##### An Appeal to Castellar.

MADRID, April 20.—Last evening the parties constituting the Cortes held their preliminary meetings. Senator Silvel presided over the meeting of the conservative minority. In the course of his remarks, he advised all conservatives to support the government.

The republican party has sent a message to Senor Emilio Castellar appealing to his patriotism to take part in the parliamentary campaign. The communication points out that "during the present situation is the duty of the republicans to maintain an expectant attitude towards the monarchy, but at the same time to stand ready to make the sacrifices demanded by patriotism, in the face of a powerful enemy, for the defence of Spanish sovereignty over Cuba, the preservation of which is demanded by the historic security and rights of Spain."

#### ON THE MOVE.

##### Troops for the Seat of War.

NEW YORK, April 20.—Three companies of the 13th Infantry, numbering 200, from Governor's Island left Jersey City yesterday over the Pennsylvania railway for the south. They were in heavy marching order. There was an immense crowd about the Jersey City ferry station and depot. The train pulled out amid tremendous cheers.

BUFFALO, N. Y., April 10.—Five companies of the Thirteenth U. S. Infantry, under command of Colonel Smith, left here this afternoon on the Nickel Plate road for Tampa. Vast crowds of people assembled in spite of the rain and cheered the soldiers until the trains passed out of sight. During the day the regiment was presented with two handsome silk flags.

#### MUTINY ON A BARK

##### Two of the Crew Were Killed.

NEW YORK, April 20.—The British bark Samoa arrived yesterday morning from Taital. On January 9th while in port at Taital, a mutiny broke out on board, in which two of the crew were killed. The cause of the mutiny was owing to several of the seamen being refused shore leave. One of the ringleaders, named Sanderson, got into an altercation with Chief Officer Searls, and the latter shot Sanderson dead. Shortly afterwards, when Searls learned that Sanderson was dead, he placed his revolver to his temple and killed himself. Captain Fretwurst succeeded in quelling the mutiny and had two of the ringleaders arrested and lodged in prison ashore.

#### The Malaga Riots.

The Imparcial, of Madrid referring to the attack upon the American Consulate at Malaga deplores the outrage, and necessarily calling for apologies, and warns the Malaguenses against provoking a war which Spain would avoid if possible. The Imparcial adds:—"Rioting is no proof of courage. The Greeks made demonstrations many days in Athens, but this did not prevent them from quickly forsaking the heights of Thesealy. The Spaniards should enter the conflict like gentlemen, and not like ruffians."

#### Spaniards in the States.

AUGUSTA, Me., April 20.—Four Spaniards from the quarries in Manchester were in yesterday and filed their declarations in becoming citizens of the United States. In response to a question as to what they should do in case of war, they said there were lots of Spaniards who, if there is to be war, would prefer to fight for the United States rather than Spain.
