WINTER SUPPLIES.—There are several Prince Edward Island schooners and Gloucester fishing craft at the wharves with potatoes, turnips, butter and fish, but the number is not so great, nor the variety of products as large, as usual at this time of the year. Island potatoes sell at 75 cents a barrel, butter at 18 cents, pickled codfish at \$4 a barrel, and dry fish at \$3 50 to \$4.—Chatham World.

ADVANCE SALE.—The plan of reserved seats for Howorth's big show opened this morning at the Diamond Bookstore. Applications were made before nine o'clock. The company will arrive here on Thursday evening. On Friday at noon they will give a street parade. It is probable that a matinee for school children will be given on Saturday afternoon.

FREDERICTON DEAF AND DUMB INSTITUTION.—Mr. Geo. E. Powers is making his annual tour of the Island in the interests of the above institution. The new building now occupied affords ample accommodation for about sixty pupils. The institution is open for the admission of Island children, and the names and addresses of uneducated deaf and dumb children will be gladly received by the superintendent, Mr. A. T. Woodbridge. The children of poor parents are admitted free.

THE MARKETS.—Notwithstanding the wet weather and bad roads, the market to-day was well attended with business steady throughout the day. Butter, fresh, sold at 21 to 23 cents per lb. and firkin lots at 15 to 18 cents per dozen. Geese sold from 50 to 69 cents each, and duck at the same price per pair. Hay was in good supply at from 50 to 55 cents per 100 lbs. Oats were steady at 34 to 35 cents per bushel. Potatoes brought from 23 to 25 cents per bushel, and turnips 12 to 14 cents per bushel. Vegetables sold at usual prices.

SPECIAL DESPATCHES TO THE EXAMINER. "Too Much Learning."

LONDON, Oct. 25. In Vienna, last night, while the twenty-year-old son of Senator Banasch was playing a violin at a party which had been given to celebrate his success at some examinations which he had just passed in a creditable manner, he suddenly threw down the instrument, and before any of the guests could divine his intention, drew a revolver and shot himself dead. When the young man's father was informed of his son's suicide he appeared to be greatly shocked and fell dead from heart disease.

New Brunswick Elections.

ST. JOHN, Oct. 25. Dr. Atkinson's majority in Carleton county is only two. In Restigouche Mr. Mast is elected by only two over Murray, thus making that county two for the Government. In Gloucester county Sivewright and Blanchard were elected yesterday by five hundred majority. The parties now stand in a full house: 14 Opposition; 27 Government, including the three Independents. Nothing is known yet as to Blair's future plans, but it is believed that he will find another constituency.

Fatal Disobedience.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 25. The fast express from Shamokin on the Reading Railroad ran into a coal train in the west Mainyunk tunnel and a frightful smash resulted. So far as learned five persons were killed. The accident is due to the disobedience of orders by an engineer of one of the trains.

False Rumor.

OTTAWA, Oct. 25. The rumored changes in the Railway Department which have been set about are entirely premature. The matter of the reconstruction of the Department has not yet been considered by the Government.

To Be Released.

LONDON, Oct. 25. The Fevers Mulleney convicted of complicity in the murder of Lord Cavendish and Mr. Burke, in 1882, and D'wling, convicted of killing a policeman, are about to be released from Maryborough Jail.

Boston vs Cleveland.

BOSTON, Oct. 25. Boston defeated Cleveland yesterday, 8 to 3. Boston thus wins the championship.

Mrs. Harrison's Death.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25. Mrs. Harrison died shortly after midnight.

General Telegraphic News.

OTTAWA, Oct. 23.—A telegram was received yesterday stating that the crews of sealers seized by Russians were en route to Victoria on board a steamer from Japan. The minister, in view of the recent alleged explanation of the Russians that the seizure was the result of an attack of insanity on the part of the Russia commander, will have officials taken on that point on the arrival of the crews.

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 23.—Advices from Hong Kong says news reached Shanghai that the Yellow river has again burst its banks and twelve villages were swept away, but few lives lost.

QUEBEC, Oct. 23.—The Montreal Herald having stated that the attorney-general had held out an olive branch to Mercier, who had refused, the former speaks as follows: I have to state most emphatically that I never directly or indirectly offered to compromise or settle the Mercier prosecution, and ask you to publish that.

FREDERICTON, Oct. 23.—Chas. Goodhue was killed by the evening train from St. John, last night at Salamanca station, just below this city. He had been up to his station and had been drinking. On his way home he must have fallen on the track and went to sleep, for the wheels of the cars went over his left arm, almost severing it. The other arm was shattered. He was found an hour and a half after the train came in, lying in the ditch, and was taken home. The unfortunate man died this morning.
