St. Vincent's Orphanage Seeks Smaller Building

A spokesman for St. Vincent's Orphanage, Charlottetown, announced last night that plans are underway for ceasing operations in the present building on the Malpeque Highway, east from St. Dunstan's University. The building now housing the orphanage is not considered to be far too large for the scale of operations which has declined by about 70 per cent over the past five years.

The caring of the orphaned children is being continued in the present building for several months, during which time attempts will be made by the Catholic Charities Commission to locate another site providing made suitable for the orphanage. The spokesman said, that the present building is capable of housing up to 100 children, and up to about five or six years ago it was nearly always filled close to capacity.

But since 1957 the number of children requiring care and adoption has steadily declined, and in each of the past five years has dropped to between 25 and 35. Monthly 100 per cent has been reduced from 10 to eight.

TO FIND FOSTER HOMES

After a number of months thinking, the emphasis will be on the placing of children in foster homes, as steadily declined, and if suitable couples are available to have them adopted within a reasonable time.

Under this plan, the new quarters, when located, will serve as a waiting room for children, where the child will continue to receive schooling and medical attention. Arrangements have been made for adoption or the placing in a foster home.

Price For Steers Eases Slightly

Prices expected here this week for Red Brand steers are unchanged from last week when Canada Packers were offering \$17.75 per hundred pounds on a lot dressed wethers' trade basis, but other prices are down.

P.E.I. Hospital And Employees Reach Contract Agreement

M. A. Hughes, representative from the National Union of Public Employees, has announced that employees of the Prince Edward Island Hospital, Local 905 of the union have reached agreement on a 1962-63 contract with the hospital. This is the first agreement signed in this area.

Standard union clauses are contained in the contract which provides for a seven per cent increase retroactive to July 1, 1962, and a further 5.5 per cent increase effective Jan. 1, 1963. Other provisions are the implementation of a 40-hour week in December, 1963, and a guaranteed scale of unused portion of sick leave, 50 to 100 per cent from three to 15 years of service.

The vacation clause follows the British standard with two weeks after one year, three after 10 years and four after 20 years of service. The contract terminates Dec. 31, 1962.
